The first general election in Italy under the expanded franchise made no matertal change in the strength of parties in the Chamber of Deputies. The popularity of the Giolatti government is shown in a slightly increased government majority. All the republicans, socialists and clerical leaders were re-elected. A symptom of growing conservatism is seen in the defeat of Amticure Ciprian, former member of the Paris commune, and of Prince Sciptone Borghesa, a radical extremist. The coalition of fire-enting radicals led by Mayor Nathan of Rome gets a hammer knock in forcing Prince Teano Caetani to a second ballot. Another surprising incident of the balloting is the election in Sicily of Nunzio Nasi, former minister of public instruction, who was developed a preference for the parcel post convicted in 1908 of graft in connection with erection of a public building in Rome, a job which exuded graft scandal as copiously as the Pennsylvania state capitol.
