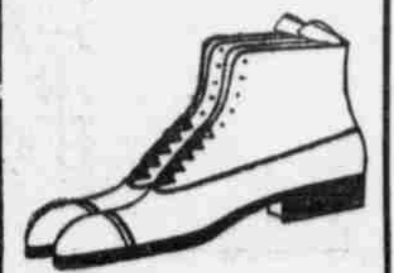

AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

M. C. Peters Milling Co. Buys Up Whole Square of Ground.

MAY VACATE PART OF F STREET

County Treasurer Urges Foreclosure of Tax Liens Will Be Strictly Enforced.

The M. C. Peters Milling company has purchased a whole square of ground adjoining their mill at Twenty-ninth and B streets and will erect a new mill on it. The deal has been lately consummated and the company is already making arrangements for the breaking of ground on the new tract. Before beginning the actual construction work on a new mill the Peters Milling company is seeking to have the city extend its sewer connection to their plant. The matter was taken up with City Attorney Henry C. Murphy and City Engineer Herman Best yesterday. The Peters Milling company is one of the biggest of its kind in the country. The aim of the company is to erect a more modern mill and to extend its line of feed manufacture along with its old line of alfalfa.

May Vacate F Street. Representatives of the Union Stock yards and the city attorney's office will meet today sometime for the purpose of taking up the question of vacating F street under the new viaduct. The ordinance looking to the vacating of the street was introduced some time ago by Councilman Jay N. Williams, but was held up in the office of the city attorney until the rights of the taxpayers could be more carefully guarded in any transfer of land from the city to private owners. It is the contention of the city attorney's office that the ground in question should not be vacated or transferred absolutely to any private concern, but that if any transfer is made it should be made in such wise that the city will be able at all times to re-acquire the grant if necessary.

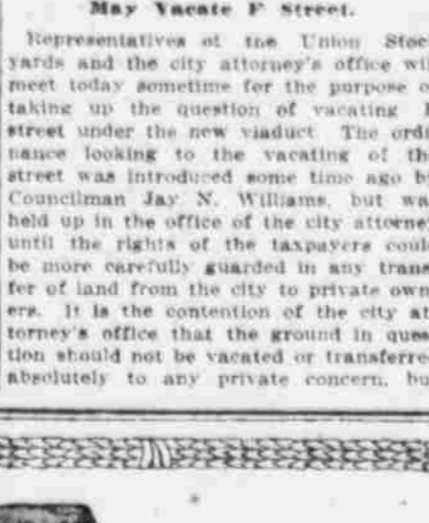
Will Foreclose Tax Liens. County Treasurer Ure has directed a letter to City Treasurer Martin to the effect that the enforcement of the old law gives the county the right to foreclose on a tax lien. County Treasurer Ure wants City Treasurer Martin to know that his threat to use the old law is something more than a mere threat. The county treasurer intimates that the same policy could be adopted in South Omaha for delinquent city taxes. Under the law about to be revived by the county treasurer any property upon which the county holds a lien for unpaid taxes can be foreclosed and sold by the county for the amount of the tax. A title acquired at such a sale is confirmed in the new purchase two years after purchase. City Treasurer Martin said he would look into the matter.

Judge English yesterday dissolved the injunction restraining the street railway company from replacing the cobble stones on the tracks between L and O streets on Twenty-fourth street. The order was issued Saturday at the instance of Dr. John W. Koutsky and a hearing had Wednesday. The court handed down a decision yesterday, holding that the plaintiff was not a proper party to the suit as having no special interest in the work done. The railway company will restore the rock and gravel it with consent so as to make a smooth topping. Dr. Koutsky's petition was filed by Attorney C. J. Southard and represented the objections voiced by a number of Twenty-fourth street business men.

Will Watch the Boys. In accordance with his annual custom, Chief of Police John Briggs will give instructions to the police force tonight as to the handling of the youth of the city celebrating Halloween. The night is generally a busy one for the police of South Omaha and Chief Briggs is among the busiest of the police. The boys and girls of the city have a wholesome respect for the big police chief and it is not a word from him to check their pranks on Halloween.

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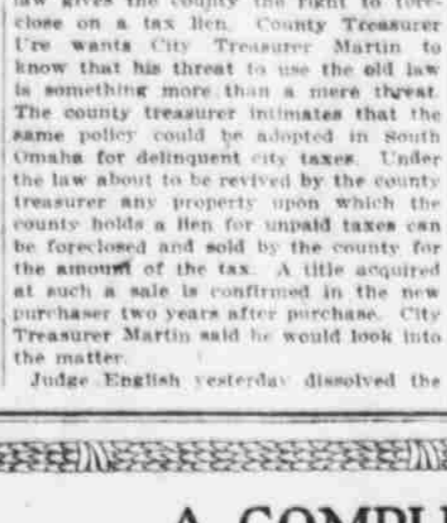
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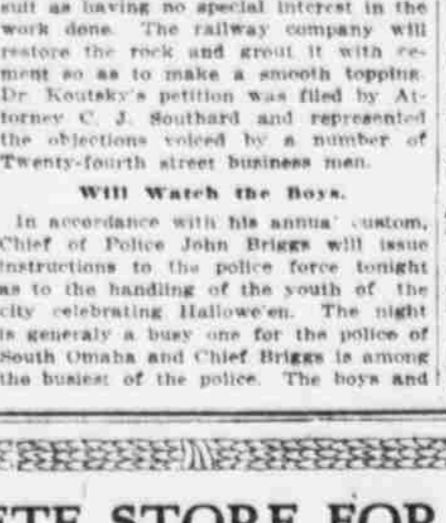
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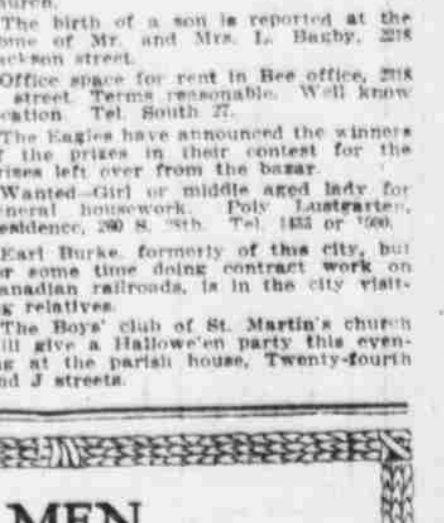
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
