



#### Standard Starts Mammoth Refinery at Casper, Wyoming

At Casper, Wyo., the Standard Oil comany has commenced construction of the argest motor spirits and oil refining plant in the world. It will be completed early next spring and will have a capacity of 30,000 barrels of the two products daily.

The Standard's new plant is the fourth t its refineries to be built at Casper. The new plant covers ten acres of ground. All of the buildings are of brick, steel and cement, and in the construction of the new plant, employment is given to too men. Complete the buildings and the stills will cost \$1,500,000. This plant, like the others, is right in town, being but six blocks from the business center.

The importance of Casper as an oil shipping point has already been recognized by the Burlington, that has been operating into the town but little more than a week. Already it is handling out ten to twelve tank cars daily, most of the product going into Montana, Washington and to coast points. The business is growing so rapidly that it is difficult o secure enough tank cars to handle the


