OMAHA, Oct. 31, 1913.

Not only snap, but buying, orders were lacking in the wheat market yesterday, and fractional recessions were suffered for the day. Considerable pressure was to be seen during the first hour of the session, but as the wheat thrown into the pit was fairly well absorbed, the believers in lower prices were cautious about attempting to break values by making liberal offers.

The lack of buying power caused by the fact that many of the larger shorts covered on Wednesday and most of them paid the highest prices reached. It was fashionable for these same people to put out short lines yesterday and they will probably stand on these times for a profit, and there is a possibility of another disappointment over taking them before they are many days older. It would be well for those who are known as enthusiastic bears to abstain from putting out heavy short lines under present conditions, as some of the strongest men in the country size long on wheat in the Chicago market and, believing it is worth the present price, they are certain to have resting orders in the pit on the buying side around certain levels. Professionals in wheat continue to act as one man. When the more conservative traders are seen on the buying side they are followed by a goodly number of buyers, and when they take the selling side they are also followed.
