POLICEMEN TURN IN BADGES

Indianapolis Officers Refuse to Ride on Cars with the Breakers.

MAYOR DEFENDS THE POLICE

Sheriff and Business Men Discuss Ways to Prevent Rioting During the Street Railway Strike.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 4.—Thirty patrolmen of the Indianapolis police force turned in their badges today rather than ride on street cars and protect strike breakers. A squad of fifty more policemen detailed to guard a car which was made ready to start proceeded so strongly against riding on the car that the effort to resume traffic was abandoned and the police returned to patrol duty on the streets.

BARN OF ROME MILLER AT HIS HOME IS DESTROYED

The magnificent barn and garage of Rome Miller caught fire yesterday, and before the fire department could arrive and extinguish the flames had damaged the barn to the extent of several hundred dollars and completely ruined Mr. Miller's new Lincoln automobile valued at \$5,000 and several expensive implements. Mr. Miller's barn is a three-story affair and is much more expensive than ordinary residence dwellings. The servants' quarters are all on the upper floor of the barn, while the other two floors act as store rooms and the garage. Mr. Miller has insurance on the barn, but he is not certain as to its extent.

VICTOR ROOS GOES TO THE CHICAGO MOTORCYCLE SHOW

Victor Roos has gone to Chicago to attend the National Motorcycle and Accessory show now in progress there. Roos says the motorcycle industry has grown to such proportions that the show

will occupy the entire Coliseum, while last year the show was held in Manufacturers building, which has but one-fourth the floor space of the large and commodious Coliseum and could not accommodate all that wished to exhibit.

Kansas Gas is Under Control of Receivers

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 4.—The property of the Kansas Natural Gas company legally is under the jurisdiction of the state court receivers appointed by Judge Flannery in Independence, Kan., according to a decision handed down today by the United States circuit court of appeals in St. Paul, Minn., according to a telegram received here by John H. Atwood, chief counsel for the state receiver. Today's decision confirms a decision handed down by Judge Marshall June 8, 1912, in the federal district court in Kansas City, Kan. It gives complete control of the properties of the company to state court receivers to the exclusion of receivers appointed by the federal court. Control of the gas company properties was sought by the federal receivers on grounds of priority of claim and assertions of the interstate nature of the business done by the gas company.

IRISH RESOLVE NOT TO PAY TAXES UNDER ONE OF RULES

BELFAST, Ireland, Nov. 4.—A resolution to pay no taxes under an Irish home rule parliament and to make government under its rule impossible by unfinching and continuous obstruction of the law was adopted here today at a demonstration of 6,000 business men of Ulster. Those present included representatives of firms with an aggregate capital of over \$50,000,000.

OHIO UNIVERSITY BUILDING TOTALLY DESTROYED BY FIRE

ADA, O., Nov. 4.—The main administration building of the Ohio Northern university was destroyed by fire today. Only hard work of the local department saved the adjoining Brown auditorium and nearby residences. The library and many valuable records are lost and the great pipe organ is ruined. The loss will reach \$100,000.

CLERK AT UNION PACIFIC QUILTS AND GOES TO TURKEY

Everett Rosenblatt, clerk of the Union Pacific headquarters until last Saturday, is on his way to Turkey, where he will take up his new duties as secretary to the ambassador to that country.
