

KANSAS PROTEST REJECTED

Nebraska Athletic Board Goes on Record in Foot Ball Case.

DISREGARD HAMILTON'S LETTER

Feels Time Not at Hand for Severe Relations with Jayhawkers, as Many Alumni Advise Be Done.

LINCOLN, Nov. 4.—(Special)—Nebraska's athletic board this morning went on record as rejecting the Kansas protest of the playing of Clint Ross, the big colored guard of the Cornhusker team, declaring the evidence presented by Manager Hamilton had failed to sustain his contention that a "gentlemen's agreement" had been entered into against the playing of negro athletes.

The board proceeded carefully and reviewed the letters which Hamilton submitted and then voted to inform the Kansas athletic board that if Nebraska and Kansas play a week on Saturday the Cornhuskers will insist on using their entire team.

In addition to the Kansas communication, the board also considered a big pile of letters from alumni who are greatly agitated over the Kansas affair and who recommend the severing of the athletic relations with the southern schools. While the athletic board expressed appreciation of the support given it by the alumni, it was felt that the time was not ripe for any such drastic step as proposed in most of the letters.

Big Nine Rumors.
The old time rumors have been revived among the alumni at least that Nebraska will be invited to join the Big Nine conference. The sentiment was echoed in the letters to the board and those who claimed to be on the inside asserted that the invitation would not be forthcoming until Nebraska severed relations with the Missouri Valley conference.

Five of the regulars were out for practice last night, including Rutherford, Howard, Delamater, Thompson, Mastin and Elwell. The scrubs and the freshmen had a scrimmage while the regulars merely loosened out the kinks from the Ames game.

Kansas has had a scout to see Nebraska in action in three big games—Minnesota, Ames and Haskell—and Stehm says the southerners have a line on everything the Cornhuskers have in their repertoire. He thinks the time is too short to begin new formations so will rely entirely on straight foot ball for victory.

Nebraska, on the other hand, has seen Kansas but once and then the Jayhawkers were not compelled to extend themselves. Consequently the strength of the Jayhawkers is decidedly uncertain.

The let up in practice continued again tonight and few of the regulars were out.

NECK BROKEN IN FOOT BALL GAME FULLBACK GAY DIES

PHOENIXVILLE, Pa., Nov. 4.—George H. Gay of Blackinton, Mass., former star player of the Ursinus college team, died in a hospital here today from a broken neck, sustained in a foot ball game last Saturday.

Gay was playing fullback on the Union team against the Potomac eleven, and was running with the ball when he was tackled from behind. He was thrown and became unconscious. When an examination was made at a hospital it was found he was paralyzed, indicating that his spine had been injured.

CLARK TO BE RETAINED AT OMAHA FIELD CLUB

Bill Clark, the popular professional at the Omaha Field club, will be retained as instructor in golf. This action was reached by the golf committee yesterday. The older members of the club recently wished to displace Clark, but his popularity with the golf enthusiasts of the club was too strong. 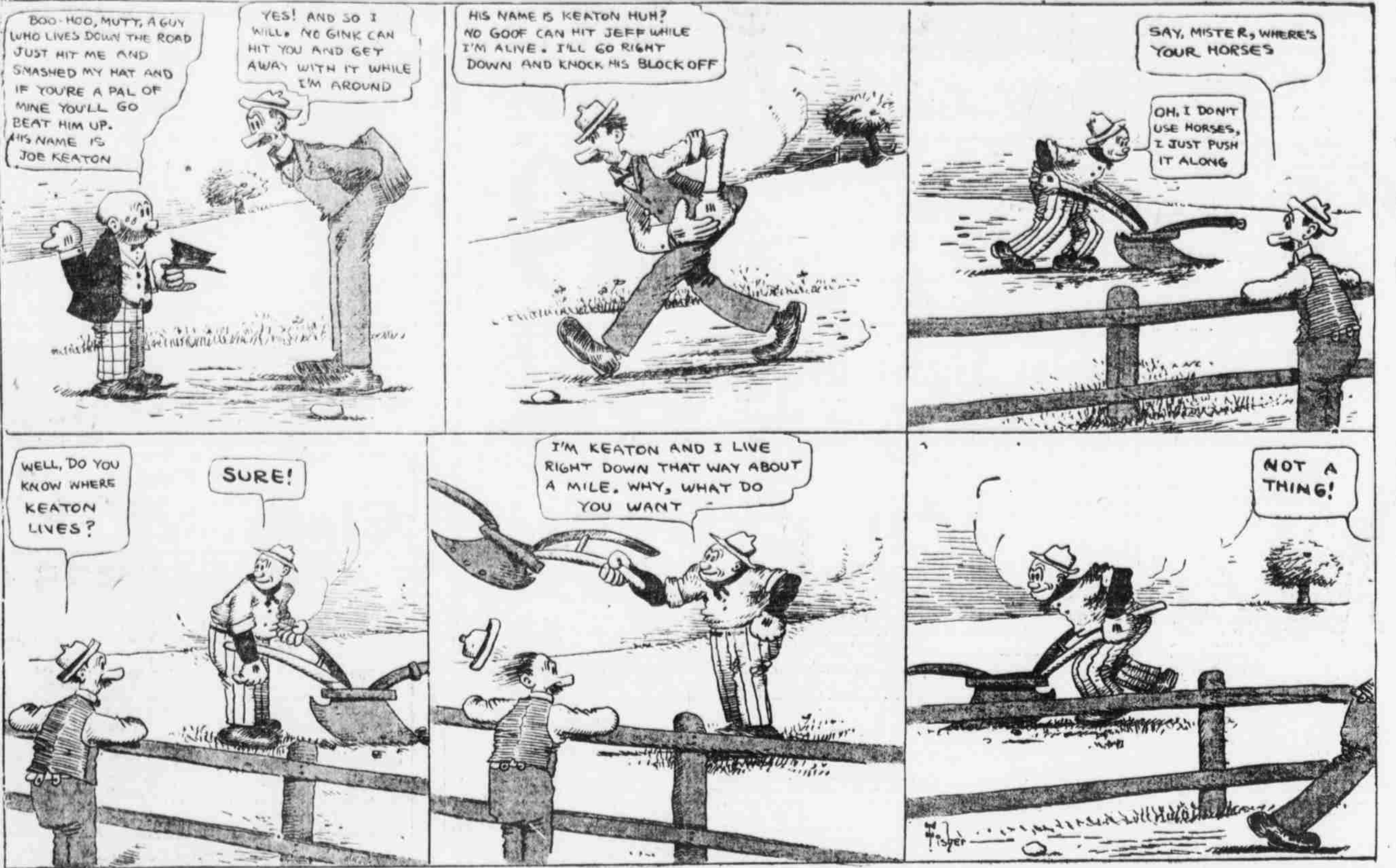

SETH HALL MUST QUIT GAME

Creighton's Giant Left Guard Will Be Obligated to Retire.

WOULD LIKE TO PLAY NEBRASKA

Local School is Ambitious to Frame Up a Game with Cornhuskers and Believes It Could Entertain Visitors.

Seth Hall, the giant left guard of the Creighton university foot ball squad, and veteran of many battles north the blue and white colors, will probably retire permanently from the gridiron game because of inflammation of the knee joint. For a week Hall has been suffering with the afflicted knee, but has struck to the game and has used every means to limber up the joint. He was unable to get into the game with Haskell, although he played part of the game against Marquette. Monday night he made a last effort and donned a suit. However, he noticed no improvement, and, according to Trainer Doctor Kelly and Hall himself, will probably be unable to play again.

Hall's loss will be severely felt, as his weight and experience were important factors in the Creighton line. Hall had the same trouble five years ago and at that time walked two weeks on crutches. He is a senior medic and this is his last

chance at varsity foot ball.

He only joined the squad shortly before the Marquette game, when the lightness of the line was evidenced by the defeat at West-levan.

Others Are Alright.

With the exception of Hall, Miller and Coady, all the men are none the worse from Saturday's battle with the Indians. Miller and Coady are suffering from minor injuries, which kept them out of practice Monday evening. Both will make the trip this week, however. Only light practice was the rule Monday night, as Coach Miller wishes to give the men a rest before their next hard game.

The big turkey day contest with the South Dakota State university eleven is still up in the air. The Creighton management has written to Vermillion asking for information, but up to a late hour Monday evening had received no reply. The loss of this game would be a big disappointment to Omahans, as it is believed that Creighton has at least a chance with the Coyotes this year. If the northerners fail to live up to their contract, there probably will be no Thanksgiving contest on Creighton field, as an attractive game cannot be scheduled at this late date. Corner may be played November 22.

Taking the showings on Nebraska and Creighton into consideration, Nebraska would be the most logical opponent for Creighton on that date, as the Cornhuskers have no game scheduled. But Creighton supporters have no hopes of a game with Nebraska, remembering Ne-

Jerome Will Not File Pleadings in Case Against Thaw

CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 4.—The good faith of the legal representatives of New York in seeking the extradition of Harry K. Thaw is attacked in a communication sent to Governor Felker today by William M. Chase of Thaw's counsel. Attorney Chase wrote:

"The introduction of the indictment obtained in New York county is additional evidence of the subterfuge which the attorney representing the state of New York is employing to obtain the aid of requisition proceedings for the return of an insane man to Matteawan, not for the purpose of protecting himself and the public against his insane acts, but for the purpose of punishment, and an insane man who is a resident of Pennsylvania and for whose conduct the state of New York is responsible only while he is actually within that state."
