### MUST WATCH THEIR HEALTH

Dr. Connell Advises School Teachers to Observe Their Pupils.

### SHOULD REPORT TO PARENTS

When a Child is Found Ailing It Should Be Sent Home with a Note Explaining Its Condition.

Medical inspection of children attending public schools is no longer an experiment, but a positive necessity, according to Dr. R. W. Connell, Omaha health commissioner, who addressed visiting teachers at the Omaha High school yesterday morning.

"I am very sorry and deplore the fact that I am not able to report the benefits of any regular medical inspection of schools of Omaha," said Dr. Connell. "So far the Board of Education here has ignored every appeal made to it for such inspection. Although Omaha is the thirty-fourth city in population, it is a lamentable fact that it is without medical inspection when more than 60 smaller cities and towns have seen the necessity to provide for it."

Physical examinations in various cities have shown, Dr. Connell said, that from 75 to 80 per cent of all children attending school have physical defects requiring the attention of a physician or dentist. The method of inspection that has been recommended by the health officer for adoption in the Omaha schools is the one that is used in Chicago. It provides that there be a physician appointed for every three schools, located as near together as possible so that the physician visit these schools every day; that if there is any reason to believe that a pupil is ailing, he be detained in the principal's room until he has been examined by the physician; that if the child shows symptoms of a contagious disease, he be sent home until the matter is definitely settled.

"Until this or some other adequate method has been established," continued Dr. Connell, "there is a great and important work for every teacher in the state, whether in city, town or country schools, namely, to act as medical examiners. Any teacher can inform himself in a few hours' time how to examine the eyes and teeth sufficiently to know when something is wrong, and when he finds it, to write a note to the parents, notifying them of a defective condition, and requesting that the child be taken to a physician or dentist for a thorough examination."

### TO READ APPEALING BOOKS

Such is the Advice of Dr. Nathaniel Butler of Chicago.

### AMERICAN AMONG GREATEST

Speaker Points Out to Teachers that Native Sons Should Be Included Among the Very Best Authors.

Reading and eating should be done in observance of the same rule. In either instance, one should take to that which agrees with one. So Dr. Nathaniel Butler of the University of Chicago, speaking on "The Uses of Literature" at the Omaha High school yesterday morning told visiting teachers.

"Literature," said Dr. Butler, "is of little value except as a help to living. There are no rules for selecting that which may profitably be read. Read anything that appeals to you, providing that it has not a corrupting influence, just as you should eat anything that satisfies a craving of the appetite, so long as it does not induce indigestion. Anything that is broadening is bound to prove helpful reading. The selection may be made almost at random."

In recommending in a general way authors who might be read to advantage, Dr. Butler stoutly maintained that American writers, more particularly poets, should have a place among the greatest contributors to universal literature.

"English critics are inclined to crown only one or two of our writers masters—probably Hawthorne and Poe," he continued. "However, the influence that many others had for moral and intellectual uplift was great. Longfellow, Whitier, Lowell and many others, have written their way into the hearts of all lovers of truly good literature."

### Oil Securities Take Big Jump

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—A sharp rise in the securities of Standard Oil companies was the feature of today's operations on the curb market. The demand is supposed to have been stimulated by belief that enforcement of the income tax may result in an easy distribution of the large surpluses held in the treasuries of subordinate companies.

Standard Oil of Kentucky advanced 45 points to 528 during the morning. Atlantic Refining rose from 65 to 80. Standard Oil of New York also registered an advance and stocks of foreign companies made minor gains.

### HASTINGS COLLEGE ALUMNI AND PRESIDENT AT REUNION

A large body of alumni of Hastings college rallied round a dinner table at the Young Men's Christian Association building for a reunion "feed." At the head of the table sat President Cronk, who, with the faculty, is promoting plans for a big "homecoming" week at Hastings next spring.

A similar reunion of ministerial alumni was held in Omaha during the Presbyterian synod last month and now the teachers are being rounded up.

"We feel the importance at Hastings of a close cohesiveness in our alumni," says Dr. Cronk. "Much that a college is and means lies in the life and co-operation of its alumni; those it sends out into the world. This is the feeling we want to propagate. Hastings, we think, is on the threshold of larger development and usefulness and it calls to all its sons and daughters, graduates and undergraduates, for their active sympathy and support."

### PULL TO HOLD DAVIDSON TELLS THE TEACHERS ABOUT MUSIC TODAY.

Washington Does Not Want Pittsburgh to Take Him Away.

APPEAL TO CONGRESS TO HELP Newspaper Asks for Appropriation to Meet Increase and Hopes President Wilson Will Exert His Influence.

Dr. William M. Davidson, former Omaha superintendent of schools, will not leave Washington for Pittsburgh for the great work done.

As head of the District of Columbia schools the doctor is paid by congressional appropriation, therefore the board cannot arbitrarily advance his salary. Here is an editorial from the Washington Post, which sets forth the feeling there toward the former Omaha educator in relation to his acceptance of the Pittsburgh offer.

Retains Dr. Davidson. The suggestion made by one of the citizens of the District, in a letter to the Post, that the difference between the salary paid to Dr. Davidson here and that offered him by Pittsburgh should be made up by popular subscription sharply calls the matter to the attention of congress. Superintendent Davidson would not accept an addition to his salary if it were obtained by popular subscription. Near congress for the District would care to have the superintendent dependent on the bounty of individuals.

If Dr. Davidson is to be held, it should be as a result of an increase in salary awarded him for his excellent services on behalf of the District. The Pittsburgh board, after its own superintendent had been ousted because of a scandal, is willing to pay our superintendent \$9,000 a year, or \$1,000 more than he receives here. If Dr. Davidson is to be retained congress should make up the difference. This is the only sensible and dignified way of retaining his services.
