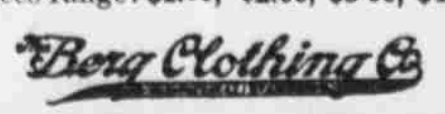

GET THEIR SPEED MEASURED

Johnson and Rucker Have Velocity of Their Pitching Tested.

DEVELOP IS PURELY MECHANICAL

Under Its Record Johnson Threw His Fastest Ball at One Hundred and Twenty-Two Feet Per Second.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The speediest ball that Walter Johnson, speediest pitcher, can pitch, doesn't travel as fast as a bullet, though it might be hard to convince some timid batters to that effect.

Johnson's fastest throw in his career, as measured by the electric device used by the Remington Arms company to test the speed of the flight of bullets.

The two boxers hurled the base ball through a wooden frame equipped with fine copper wires and against a steel plate five yards beyond the wooden frame.

The pitcher's speed was measured by mathematical exactness. They did so in Remington's laboratory.

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OLD TENNIS FIGHT ON AGAIN

Enthusiast Kicks on Scoring System and Revives Scrap.

ENGLAND IS AGAINST CHANGES

Foreigners Fight Any Changes, but Americans Are Ready to Consider Advantages of Different System.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The old question as to the advisability of changing the scoring system in lawn tennis has been revived by an enthusiast who writes, pointing out the evils of scoring by sets and the advantages of accounting for victories by the number of games won.

Under the present system, six games with a set unless the score goes to 5 all, and naturally enough in a best two out of three advantage sets match the winning of one set gives a player a desirable position.

The advocates of the game system point out matches wherein the winner actually gathers in less games than the loser, as in a match with a score of 4-6, 4-4. Here the victor has twelve games, on the face of it it would seem that the loser was the better player.

The fact of the matter is, however, that the winner probably loosed or rested during the second set, and then went out after the third.
