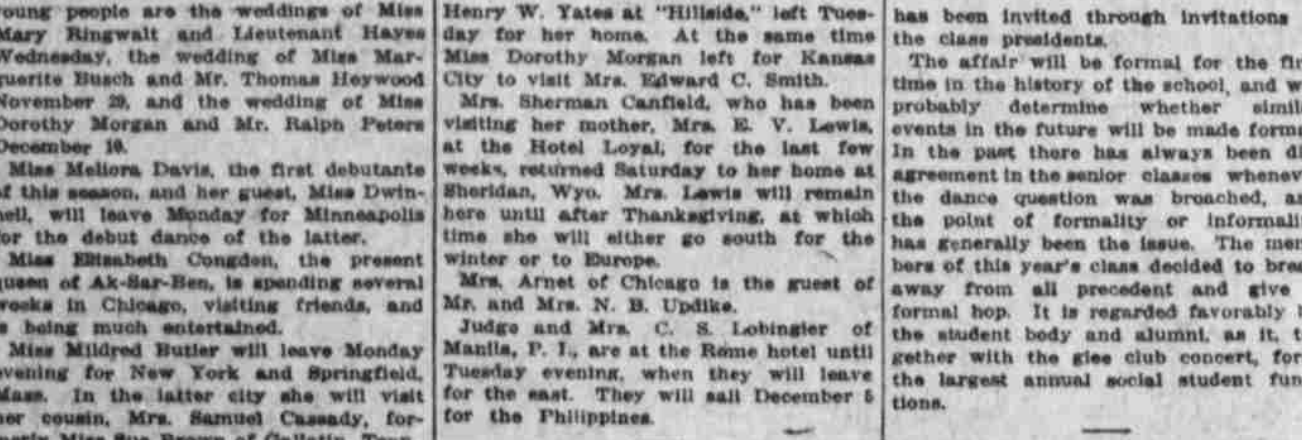

Hummel is Making Playthings for All Parks of the City A playground for youngsters will be prepared in every park in the city by Joe B. Hummel, park commissioner, during the winter, the expenses to be met when the spring appropriations are made. To build the playthings to be erected in the parks, a shop has been set up at Thirty-first and Dewey avenue and workmen are making swings and teeter-totters, under the park commissioner's supervision. Swings in sets of six will be placed in Fontenelle, Ranscom, Bemis, Riverview, Miller, Kountze and Elmwood parks. These swings will be indestructible, made of iron pipe and chains and working on ball bearings. Slides are now being installed in these parks and teeter-totters will be placed in all of them. The total expense will be about \$2,500, the park commissioner's shop cutting down the cost considerably.

Consolidation of Departments is Not to Be Made by Club After considering for a few weeks the matter of a possible consolidation of the publicity bureau and the traffic bureau with the Commercial club the executive committee has decided that this should not be done at this time. The proposition came up with the resignation of Commissioner Guild and the subsequent searching about for a man to fill his place. A committee was appointed to consider candidates for a successor to Mr. Guild. This committee immediately began to consider a possible consolidation of all the departments, with a view to placing all under one general head that could direct subheads of the traffic and the publicity bureaus. The turning down of the proposal by the executive committee will end that suggestion, at least for a time. The subcommittee will now turn attention seriously to the selection of a commissioner to fill the place which Mr. Guild will leave vacant in a little over a week.
