SPECULATORS ARE UNMOVED Cables from Buenos Ayres and Rosarlo Have but Little Effect Upon the Traders of

the Pit.

OMAHA, Nov. 15. 1312.

The news from the southern hamisphere on the growing wheat crop was more conflicting yesterday than at any time since the advices of deterioration commenced to come forward. The exportable surplus in that country was again reduced and in some of the provinces the losses were said to be sensational, mainly from hot winds and long drawn out dry spelis. The former estimate on the exportable surplus was placed at 80,00,000 bushels, but 14,000,000 of this was shaved off yesterday. In the face of these advices the Buenos Ayres market opened 180% lower yesterday, and this caused many scattered holders to throw their grain overboard. While it is true that Argentine shipments were estimated at only 685,000 bushels for this week, this is nearly 20,000 bushels lyarger than the previous week, but only about one-third the shipments for the corresponding period a year ago.

NET CHANGES MOSTLY NOMINAL

General Disposition to Await Developments in Regard to Mexlean Affairs Over the Week End.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Trading in stock was light throughout the half day session which brought the week to an end, and in most cases net changes were only nominal. After a firm opening the market became heavy, more because of a lack of demand than from any marked pressure. Investment buyers held alcof. Speculators worked with caution, being inclined to take the bear side because of the absence of support and the continued weakness of various stocks, such as Missouri Pacific, New Haven and Lehigh Valley. Losses were small, however, and they were largely made up on scattered buying toward the close. Lehigh Valley was heavy throughout New Haven duplicated its dally performance recently by making a low record at 75. Missouri Pacific at 15% was at the year's lowest. There was a general disposition to await developments in regard to Mexican affairs over the week end, and business was restricted by this consideration. The day was barren of news with an influence on market values with the exception of further pessimistic reports from the steel trade. The weekly reviews of trade conditions referred to lessened commercial activity in various lines.

The bank statement made the expected good showing. There was an actual gain in currency of more than 112,000,000 and 37,383,000 was added to the surplus.
