PROTEST FROM MINISTERS

Objection Made to Official Character Given Thanksgiving Mass.

WASHINGTON ASSOCIATIONS ACT

Resolution Says Catholic Church is Using Attendance of President and Judges to Give a Wrong Impression.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Protestant clergymen of the capital have launched a protest against the official atmosphere which is being thrown about the annual Pan-American Thanksgiving mass here in St. Patrick's church.

The Rev. Dr. R. H. McKim, former president of the Episcopal church of deputies, is the author of a resolution adopted today by the Episcopalian, Lutheran, Baptist and Disciples of Christ clergy and which will be considered by Presbyterian clergymen Monday.

The attendance of his chief magistrate and members of his cabinet, year after year, says the resolution, "has been made use of to give color to the Roman claim that the service is the official celebration of Thanksgiving day in our national capital."

"We protest against the attempt to convert our national Thanksgiving day into a Roman Catholic festival in a service entirely out of harmony with the history of the genius of our country and the spirit and purpose of the day."

"We desire to give voice to the widespread feeling of indignation among millions of Protestants of America against the efforts of the Roman press and the Roman hierarchy to exploit the presence of our chief magistrate and some of his cabinet, which we are convinced, has only been intended as an act of courtesy and good will, for the purpose of glorifying the Roman Catholic church and giving this service an official character which it does and cannot possess."

TALK OF BLOCKADE OF MEXICAN PORTS IS AGAIN RENEWED

The capital with mobs of the lower classes, led by students, who shouted against everything American. Mexicans explain the difference in sentiment as due to the character of the present controversy, which fails to enlist the sympathy of the people.

Foreigners flock to coast. Owing to the menacing of the town of Orizaba, by the rebels and the consequent threatening of communication between the federal capital and Vera Cruz, foreigners are flocking to the coast in large numbers.

Colonel Ramirez, in command of the garrison at Orizaba, is fortifying the strategic points about the city and reporting to the government that he will be able to resist any attack by the rebels.

A battle was fought yesterday at Arrio de Rosales, in the state of Michoacan, between city federal soldiers and 300 rebels. The rebels are said to have withdrawn from the field after three hours of fighting, leaving twenty-two dead and many wounded. Only one federal is reported killed.

Colonel Victoria, the capital of Tamaulipas, reported several days ago as captured by the rebels, is alleged in dispatches published here today, to have been just attacked, and fighting is said to be going on in the suburbs. The garrison of the city is believed to number 600 federals.

No announcement has yet been made of a successor to Manuel Garza Aldape as minister of the interior. The removal of Querido Madero from the foreign ministry to that of the interior, and the appointment of Pedro Lascurain to the post of foreign minister, which he filled under President Madero, have been discussed.

Advance on Juarez. EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 18.—Federals are advancing north from Chihuahua City in the direction of Juarez, captured by the rebels Saturday morning.

A battle took place between the advancing federals and the rebel rear guard at Laguna media, between Juarez and Chihuahua, last night. Pancho Villa, captor of Juarez, admitted this today. He also admitted losing five men killed in the battle, but said the federals lost thirty-five.

Villa did not have any details as to the number of men engaged on either side. It is generally known here that at least five of the fourteen men whom the rebels now admit executing were not in Mexico City at the time of the uprising and Mexican Consul Diebold asserts that not one of the officers executed was in Mexico City.

General Huerta to Retire. BEHAIN, Nov. 18.—The retirement of General Huerta from the provisional presidency of Mexico is now the surest way to restore order in that country, said an editorial today in the Tageblatt, which heretofore has steadily attacked the American policy in Mexico.

The newspaper quotes approvingly the report that the German minister to Mexico has advised Huerta to accept the American proposals.

The Tageblatt's previous hostility to the United States is explained in the concluding paragraph of the article. "The political power of the Monroe doctrine," says the paper, "is now stronger than ever before and it is moreover assuming an economic aspect. Europe should guard against any attempt to introduce it into the Mexican business field."

EASTERN VALUATION EXPERT TO COME HIGH

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 18.—(Special.)—The State Railway commission received a message from E. W. Bemis, the eastern expert engineer, who is coming to Nebraska to make an investigation of the physical valuation of the telephone plants at York, conveying the intelligence that he would start very soon, and that in case he could not get an expert by the name of Pillsbury to help him he would bring another man by the name of Storm.

The kick made by the York telephone subscribers against the valuation of the plant made by the railway commission physical engineers, requiring the commission to hire these experts from the east, will cost the state \$5 a day for Bemis and \$5 a day for his assistant.

Davis Gets Small Verdict. LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 18.—(Special.)—After being out twelve hours a jury brought a verdict of \$175 damages in favor of

Charles Davis, against the Union Pacific Railroad company. The case resulted from a heavy windstorm blowing a passenger train, in which the plaintiff was riding, from the track between Ord and North Loup, over a year ago. This is the second trial of the case, the jury failing to agree before. The costs of the case have been assessed against Davis and amount to about \$700.

SILOS AND SEPARATORS INCREASING IN STATE

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 18.—(Special.)—Farmers of Nebraska are steadily and constantly buying silos for the improvement of their farms.

In April, 1913, there were 2,065 silos in Nebraska. In 1912 there were 1,800 silos. The number of silos in use in 1911 was 1,644, in 1912, and 4,782 in 1911.

The State Dairymen's association has made a consistent fight for the erection of silos, as has the State Board of Agriculture and the experts of the state farm. Silage and silos have been given particular attention and several valuable bulletins have been issued by the state farm authorities on these subjects.

There will be a "Go day" at the mid-winter meeting of the state dairymen. An effort will be made to secure the views of the rank and file on this subject. The dairymen will meet during the week of Organized Agriculture, January 13 to 23.
