Bason begs leave to report that they very care fully investigated the matter and find that Mr. Bason was employed as vocational director after a careful inquiry by the superintendent of instruction informs us that Mr. Bason was most highly recommended by his former employers as a very efficient and capable instructor and a man of good moral character and that he is doing splendid work and has proved himself equal to the standard of his recommendations.

Your committee further reports that at the time of the engagement of Mr. Bason the question of his attitude toward organized labor was never mentioned or even thought of by your committee, the only question being that of his ability and qualifications for the position to be filled.


