GENIUS OF PIRATICAL SEERS

Swindling Methods of Head Push of Chicago Clairvoyant Crooks.

Harry Walte, clairvoyantly known as Prof. David K. Ross, has unfolded to State's Attorney Hoyne of Chicago the first chapters of an autobiography that the latter believes will be the most startling tale of dual indentity he ever has beard.

As Walte, the shrewd business man (he probably has several other names). he is said to be the owner of a long string of moving picture theaters in Ohio. As Ross, he was the presiding genius of the national "clairvoyant" trust," according to the state's officers. He is under indictment charged with swindling eight en out of an aggregate of \$7,455.

Walts or Ross, was questioned for having been arrested yesterday in St. Louis. He told little concerning himself, out enough to convince Hoyne that the noney he "carned" as a clairvoyant at 1138 Michigan avenue was only a "drop in the bucket" as compared to his winnings in other cities.

Most of the known victims of Ross sald that he sold them bogus mining stock, after telling their fortunes and advising them how to invest their money. In the cipher code of the mystics they were call "script 25s" (stock-buying suck-Here are the names of the persons

whom Ross is said to have swindled, and the amounts that he received from each; Dan Schneider, \$1,000; Elizabeth Baer, \$1,400; August Lindstrom, \$2,500; John Rumirs, \$2,300; Emil Kazor, \$838; Fred Hogan, \$175; John W. Ganzy, \$250, and

Lindstrom, a Michigan farmer, told the grand jury that he not only lost the \$2,500, but because he lost it he also lost his wife and eight children. He said they left him when they learned how he

Waite told many stories about his victims. Then he laughingly told of a new game he is going to play "within the law" when he gets out of his present predicament.
