At each of the four corners was a massive trellis work covered with climbing roses. Behind these were the cosy corners, having a background of 'varsity foot ball blankets.

The balcony was draped with the Creighton blue and white bunting, as vere the smaller electric lights. Each of the piliars supporting the balcony was clothed in bunting of the same bues, and were connected with interwoven ropes of blue and white rope.

From the ceiling hung a half dozen large lights, their rays softened with enveloping strips of orange, blue and white, The grand march was lead by Miss Margaret Morrison and Francis L. Bushman, president of the class.

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
