Canada for protection. It was indicated that they probably would be taken aboard an American warship, as was Felix Diaz, Americans Refuse to Pay War Tax.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 21.—A demand was made today by the federal military authorities on all the foreign business concerns in Monterey for cash to provide for the maintenance of the army in that district. From the Monterey Steel company 20,000 pesos was asked and from the Waters-Pierce Oil company, 15,000 pesos. Others were taxed in proportion to their importance. The managers of the Waters-Pierce Oil company instructed their representatives in Monterey to refuse payment of the levy and to place themselves and the property of the company under the protection of the American consul.

Hard fighting was still in progress today about Ciudad Victoria, the capital of the state of Tamaulipas, according to information issued by the war office. Although the city was said to have been captured by the rebels on Tuesday, last, it is now claimed that General Antonio Rabago, the federal commander, is still holding the place, although continuous fighting has gone on inside the city for the last twenty-four hours. Federal reinforcements under General Ruben Navarro are due to relieve the garrison at any moment.

Blame Wilson for Villa's Crimes.
Commenting on the situation in an editorial article today El Pais says: "Does President Woodrow Wilson not know, or does he not care to know, that in history and before the civilized world he will be obliged to answer the charges which humanity will make against Francisco Villa?"

The article then recapitulates the crime of murder and pillage attributed to Villa, the rebel leader, at Torreon and Juarez, alleging that if the revolution triumphs, Villa will become vice president, minister of war or some other functionary, by virtue of the valuable services he has rendered to Venustiano Carranza, the constitutional leader. It continues: "This President Wilson should know, and does know for a certainty, yet wishing to justify his unwarranted and absurd meddling in our affairs, he chooses to protect Francisco Villa the better to impose his will and caprice on Mexico, even though such a course be the direct cause of crimes without number, such as have been committed at Torreon, Juarez and many other towns."

The impartial publisher today under a score head the statement that adherents of Carranza in the vicinity of Juarez shot two American army officers. This news is alleged to have been conveyed to the federal capital by private messages, which declare that President Wilson is horrified by the executions carried out by Villa, which have inclined him to give to the Mexican question "the solution demanded by justice and common sense—that is to say, the recognition of the constituted government, whose chief is the illustrious Huerta."

Recruits for Carranza.
CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—General Lee Christmas, widow of fortune, has just completed a successful recruiting campaign

here in behalf of General Carranza, head of the constitutional forces of Mexico. It was heard today.
Christmas left for the border last night with some of his recruits and the others followed him today, nineteen in all, it is said. Christmas was liberally supplied with money. He promised pay ranging from \$200 to \$500 a month, according to the experience and abilities of the men enlisted, and bound his contracts by payments of \$50 and \$200. Two of the recruits who will receive maximum salaries are expert telegraphers and all have had some experience in warfare.

CURZON FILES FRIENDLY SUIT AGAINST LEITER

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Lord Curzon began a friendly suit in the district courts here today against Joseph Leiter, to change the trustees for the \$1,700,000 marriage settlement which was made on his deceased wife, who was Mary Victoria Leiter, Seymour Morris of Chicago and Henry Molyneux Paget Howard, earl of Suffolk and Berkshire, will be substituted for Robert T. Lincoln, former secretary of war, and William S. John Freemantle Broderick, Viscount Middleton, Joseph Leiter, executor of the Leiter estate, has agreed to the change.

The woman thought Bernstein was "getting fresh" and she came back with a smart slap. Then she saw the danger, and escaped. Bernstein was slightly grazed by the car.

Svoytek Under Arrest.
While the injured were being cared for, a crowd of several thousand persons gathered. Bernstein and Officer Ringlingman and Wright placed Chauffeur Svoitek under arrest, and he is being detained pending an investigation. Still was also arrested, but was later released upon his own recognizance.

While the crowd was standing in the streets traffic was tied up. Police Commissioner Ryder endeavored to get the situation in hand, and while directing his men a negro on a motorcycle going at a high rate of speed, went dashing through the crowd. Several persons narrowly escaped injury.
"Get that man!" roared Ryder.
Several officers started to obey, but Mogy Bernstein, by firing his revolver several times into the air, made him stop. The negro said his name was John Holmes, employed by the Kilpatrick company. He told Ryder that his wife was dying at 113 North Thirty-second street and he was hurrying to her. Ryder took his name and allowed him to go.
Police surgeons say that all of the victims will recover, excepting the Council Bluffs woman, who is in a critical condition.

visit which Belonges does not deny, surprised most of those familiar with the case by avowing that he heard talk about "Your winter's coal." When asked if he had told a man who was then in the court room that he had not heard a word of what was said by the two men the lad admitted he had, but said he had told the truth to Clinton Brown, who, he revealed, went to his house several days ago.

Wesley Gard, his wife, his son and Charley Tasech, who lives across the street from the Garda, told stories similar in phrasing. Gard standing cross-examination much better than the others.
Mrs. Gard became confused as to the number of times she and her husband had visited the Bromes' office and was unable to recall what they talked about there, but was quite positive the present case was not discussed. Both admitted having been at the office yesterday morning before the hearing began. Mrs. Gard positively fixed dates of Belonges' visits to her home, but could not give the date of a single visit to the Bromes' office. She and her husband "just happened in," she said.

Vigorous assertion by Judge Ben E. Baker that "I will show to the court that if there is any contempt in this case it is on the part of the man Gard and not my client," marked the morning's session of the hearing. Gard told with amplifications on the stand substantially the story he related in his affidavits.
The hearing will not be resumed until next Wednesday.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 21.—Matrons make the best possible teachers for the young, according to Prof. Earl Barnes, who lectured before the Missouri university extension center here today.
"The present day educational system puts a premium on the greatest sin in the world, celibacy," said Prof. Barnes. "Particularly is it wrong to insist that only unmarried women be allowed to teach in public schools."
"What better teachers could be found for children than the cultured married women coming from a congenial home into the school room?"
"No greater insult ever was given to American womanhood than the act of the New York School Board of Education in asking the resignation of a married teacher who had requested leave of absence that she might become a mother."

INSURANCE OFFICIALS EXAMINE FORESTERS

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—Insurance authorities of Illinois, Wisconsin and Nebraska, who have been examining reports of the actuarial and legal questions involved in the operation in the United States of the Independent Order of Foresters of Toronto, Canada, concluded their conference today and expect to make a report in a week.
Rufus M. Potts and Herman L. Ekern, insurance commissioners of Illinois and Wisconsin, respectively, and J. M. Gilchrist, representing the Nebraska department, have been studying the situation of the Independent Order of Foresters at the request of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners.
On the report of the committee will depend the attitude of the insurance commissioners of all the states of the union. Reorganization of the Independent Order

of Foresters, while in accordance with the Canadian law, has been questioned under some state laws.
