

MUST TEAR DOWN SHACKS

Commissioner Withnell So Notifies Real Estate Firms.

WEAD IS THE WORST OFFENDER

Department of Fire Protection Will Not Let Him Repair Old Houses that Are Dangerous to Other Property.

City Commissioner C. H. Withnell of the department of fire protection has notified half a dozen real estate firms that he will begin prosecuting them if ramshackle buildings they control are not demolished.

"F. D. Wead is one of the worst offenders," said Withnell, speaking of the real estate member of the board of directors of the Metropolitan Water district. "He has several buildings which he wants to repair and which we will insist on his tearing down."

The real estate men are stubborn in their refusal to comply with the request

of this department. I have given them to understand that they must act and act soon or we will act for them.

"We have a great deal of trouble with nonresident property owners, who permit their buildings to reach a dangerous state of dilapidation," said Withnell. "One such firm has given us considerable trouble. School teachers have complained of an old elevator building owned by Jackson and his agents, have refused to do anything."

City Fire Warden Ed Morris has a list of several buildings which, under the direction of Commissioner Withnell, will be ordered repaired or torn down.

Nebraska's 1913 Crops Figure More Money Than Last Year

That while Nebraska's crops, measured by the hundredweight or in bushels, do not make as big a showing as last year, measured in dollars and cents, they are larger, is the finding of The Twentieth Century Farmer, based on figures just compiled. It finds reinforcement, too, in the latest bank report, which shows that the loans of the state banks have increased \$2,283,428.25, since a year ago.

The majority of the stock in the 714 state banks of Nebraska is owned by farmers. The \$12,269,812.64 increase in deposits means so many dollars and cents have been retained by their possessors from the output of our fields and farms, for the results come mainly from agriculture. Quoting from The Farmer:

The 1913 corn crop in the states of Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri and Kansas, according to the best government and state estimates, is only about 10 per cent as large as it was in 1912. Yet the other crops, such as wheat, oats, alfalfa, wild and tame hay, etc., are sufficiently large to offset the loss in corn.

A Good, Bad and Good Season. The growing season of 1913 was divided into three periods. From early spring up to the first of July conditions were ideal. During this period the wheat crop in the state was matured and exceeded the season of 1912 by 17,748,000 bushels.

lighter. Following this period came the dry season, which hit the corn crop and the later cuttings of alfalfa. This was followed by good fall rains, which revived the pastures and enabled the farmers to sow their winter wheat for the 1914 crop. Reliable estimates for the four states show that the acreage is much larger than was sown last year.

Nebraska as an illustration. "We are not able at this time to gather as complete figures and estimates from other states, so will use Nebraska as an illustration of the crop conditions in the Missouri valley states. The average yearly value of the corn crop in Nebraska since 1880 has been \$58,272,377. The value of this year's crop, based upon the government's estimate of 114,385,000 bushels, at the present cash value is \$7,811,800.

The average yearly value since 1880 of the wheat crop has been \$2,888,188, while the value of this year's crop is \$6,949,596, practically double. The average yearly value of oats since 1890

is \$1,706,982. This value of this year's crop is \$19,223,154. The average yearly value of the three crops since 1880 is \$4,393,548. The combined cash value of the three crops for 1913 is \$18,985,960, showing a value of \$4,073,112 over the yearly average value.

Nebraska's wheat yield this year exceeded that of 1912, the previous record, by over 14,000,000 bushels. The total in 1913 was 64,627,348 bushels. Of this winter wheat had 53,846,534 and spring wheat 4,880,814 bushels. In 1912 the total yield was 45,569,356.

The average yield of winter wheat this year was 15.1 bushels per acre, and the spring wheat average 12.8. Plugging the crop at 71 cents per bushel, the money value is \$46,949,566."
