

NEBRASKA WHEAT DOES WELL

Burlington Report Shows Cereal in Best Condition in Many Years.

ACREAGE UP TO THE AVERAGE

High Weather and Favorable Conditions Push the Plant Along, Greatly Encouraging the Farmers.

The Burlington's special crop report, compiled from data secured by General Superintendent Allen and up to November 18, has almost entirely to do with soil and the condition of fall wheat.

The report indicates that at the time of the receipt of the last data, while the ground in the Nebraska fall wheat belt was somewhat dry on top, half an inch below the surface it was moist and in the best condition for the growth of the cereal plant.

Relative to the acreage the Burlington report shows that it is fully up to the average and ahead of many of the former years, which is presumed to be due to the fact that last season through the south part of the state the corn yield was light and the wheat unusually heavy.

The late fall and the warm weather that has accompanied it has kept the pastures in good condition and as a rule farmers have fed little hay, and no grain to their cattle.
