LOOSE BULL PLAYS HAVOC

Frightens Pupils of the High School Until Captured. MAY HAVE CAUSED A DEATH Undertaker Thinks that it is the Same Bull Which Was Instrumental in the Death of H. E. Kelleit of Valley. Senors Jimaro Murphurto and Padre Rinnolo, otherwise known as Officers James Murphy and Patrick Rinn, were detailed to snare a loose bull whose activities on the High school campus were detaining eager youths and lazzies from the delights of school recitations. From whence the bull came no man knew, but Jimaro and Padre can testify as to where it went. Laden with coils of rope and enthusiasm the matadors were transported in the police patrol to where the male cow was holding forth. And in a twinkling of an eye had bound the submissive brute into a state of seeming helplessness. Murphurto and Rinnolo then seated themselves in the vehicle and through the rear aperture played the bull at the end of the rope as an angler would a trout. After the wagon was well underway toward a haven at Twenty-second and Cuming streets the prisoner proceeded to evince signs of reluctance upon accompanying its captors; hence Jimaro and Padre were forced to pry each other from the doorway when it would take a notion to sit down and rest, or turn around. Placed in a Barn. Finally, after exuberant spectators had ceased to enjoy the spectacle of two "bulls" arresting another, the animal decided to come along, and in a few minutes was housed in a stall of a private barn near Cuming street. No one could be found who seemed to know to whom the beast belonged. Sunday night Henry E. Kelleit, aged 47 years, of Valley, accompanied by a helper, was driving to the market in South Omaha with a bull tied to the rear of his wagon. The animal broke loose, and in attempting to catch it, Kelleit fell and was run over by the wagon when the horses started to run away. He died Monday night at a local hospital. Kelleit is survived by a wife and two children and had been a resident of Douglas county for a number of years. The bull of this morning's incident is believed by Stack & Falconer, who have charge of the Kelleit funeral arrangements, to be the one owned by the dead man.

TO SUPPLY POOR CHILDREN Pupils of Public Schools Bring Donations for the Needy. SUPPLIES GO TO CHARITIES Children of Poor Families Living Near the Schools Will Be Looked After First—No School on Thursday or Friday. All the poor children who attend school will be provided with a fat Thanksgiving dinner and supplies of warm clothing by their more well-to-do schoolmates. In some of the districts all the supplies donated by the children will go to relieving possible distress in that district. While all the supplies will be "jumped" and donated to charity organizations, the principals have arranged to secure enough food and clothing to bring cheer to the hearts of all the poor girls and boys and parents in the vicinity of their schools. School teachers, through their work with the children, have learned the names of the needy families in the poorer districts and will unostentatiously carry them baskets of food and clothing. Some of the donations were received at the school yesterday and all gifts will be in today. Schools will be closed Thursday and Friday.

Klopp Asks Counties to Comply With the Advertising Law Requesting that county officers throughout Nebraska comply with the state laws by advertising and letting by bid all contracts for county printing and supplies, the newly organized Klopp Printing company has mailed letters to all county commissioners and clerks. It has been generally rumored in Nebraska printing circles that some counties fail to comply with the law in this respect, and that certain printing firms in the state refuse to participate in competitive bidding for county printing and supplies. The letters sent out over the signature of "The Klopp Printing company, per A. T. Klopp," simply state that the company desires to bid upon printing, and cites the portion of the Nebraska statutes, which require counties to let their printing work by bid and contract, under penalty of fine or imprisonment in the penitentiary, or both. Over 600 letters have been sent out, every county clerk, every board of county commissioners and every member of such boards having received one. Replies already made indicate that it is the intention of the counties to follow the provisions of the statutes hereafter, whether or not this was done before. A convention of county officers of Nebraska will hold sessions in Omaha next week. It is thought by some county officers that official notice may then be taken of the matter of letting county printing contracts only after advertised bidding.

VENNER WOULD COMPROMISE New York Brokerage Firm Making Overtures to Omaha Now. CIRCULATORS MEAN REPORTS Concern Gets Nasty When City Would Not Return Its Earnest Money Sent in With Bid for Bonds. Reviving unpleasant recollections which but recently has faded from the minds of city commissioners, one J. H. Dumont, representing C. H. Venner & Co., of New York, dealers in bonds, appeared, hat in hand, in the office of Acting Mayor Dan B. Butler and proposed to compromise the difficulty between the city and the aforesaid C. H. Venner & Co. This difference amounts to \$5,000, the same being a check held as forfeit by the city because Venner & Co. refused to buy certain bonds which were awarded to it as lowest bidder. Butler will ask City Treasurer W. G. Ure, the city attorneys and Mr. Dumont to appear before the council in committee of the whole Monday and argue the case. "I told Dumont I was personally not anxious to compromise," said Butler, "because I think this firm has done Omaha bonds about all the damage it is capable of doing." About a year ago, when the trouble began, C. H. Venner & Co., after its demand for the return of its forfeit check was refused, instituted a series of attacks on the municipal credit of the city and circulated the country with sweeping blows at Omaha's bonds. Venner's excuse for refusing to accept the bonds after he had been awarded them was that he had offered a high premium based on the reports of the value of assessed property made by the city comptroller, and these reports were misleading.
