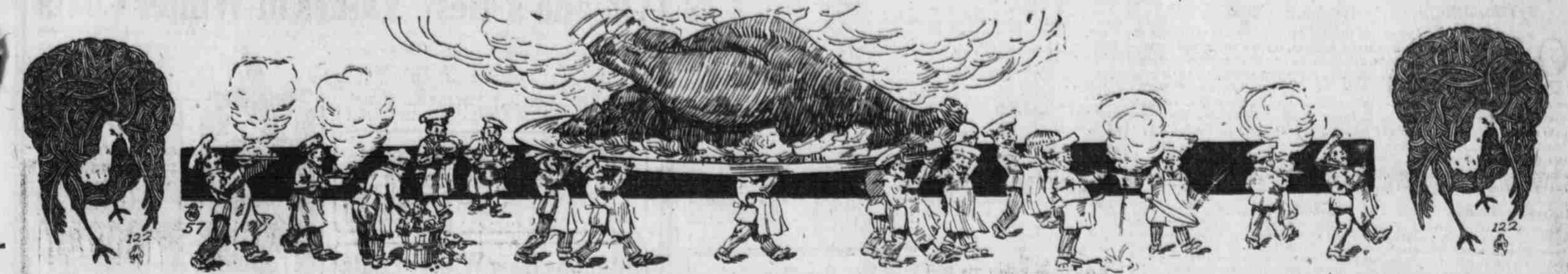

### TURKEY PRIZES ALLURING

Thousands of Answers Pour Onto Contest Editor's Desk.

### SHORT CONTEST DRAWS BIG

Answers Received Far Exceed the Expectations of Any of the Advertisers—Some of the Letters Are Great.

Hundreds upon hundreds of letters, making a veritable avalanche of several thousand, poured into The Bee office Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, flooding the contest editor's desk with replies to the questions asked in last Sunday's issue of The Bee by the editor, who promised to present the author of the most logical answers with a nice, big, fat, juicy, milk-fed Thanksgiving Turkey, fresh from Hayden's meat department.

Digging into the pile which confronted them the contest editor and several assistants worked constantly until it was time to go to press, endeavoring to make a judicious selection of prize winners from so many excellent answers. The editor had promised to make his announcements to those who would receive the turkeys in the afternoon paper, and did it, although it was a tight squeeze so great was the number of answers.

No more splendid tribute could be offered a newspaper than the manner in which the people, not only of Omaha, but of other cities and towns in Nebraska and Iowa, and even South Dakota and Missouri, responded to the single page of advertising that appeared but one day—last Sunday. It proved conclusively that Bee readers read advertisements and answer them after they have read them.

The unusually large number of replies also indicates that the population of Omaha and surrounding territory is anxious to acquire a Thanksgiving turkey without an outlay of hard-earned coin. Turkeys are flying pretty high this year for such a heavy bird, and a turkey would be considered a lavish gift. Any number of persons went to examine the prize turkeys at Hayden's store, and came away with a further determination to make a try for the prize.

The answers that were received are of every variety. From little children and from those of obviously mature age came answers. Some were accompanied by notes, of which several were pathetic appeals asking that the editor merit them a prize because otherwise there would be no Thanksgiving turkey at their house. Some answers were from wags who desired to expel any facetious characteristice that were stored up within their nervous systems. Others were poetic, some of which was very good, some passably fair and some that contained absolutely no rhythm and only was written in poetic form because it rhymed at the end of each line.

"The array of answers was peculiar, but it was gratifying to the extreme.

### Postoffice Will Be Closed All Day on Thanksgiving

The Omaha postoffice, including all departments, will, for the first time in its history, be closed all day on Thanksgiving this year. Heretofore it has been the custom to keep open half a day on that feast day.

"The closing of the postoffice throughout the whole of any holiday was tried for the first time in Omaha last Fourth of July," said Postmaster John C. Wharton, in making the announcement for Thursday. "The innovation seemed to operate to the satisfaction of all, concerned and certainly to postoffice employees. Now we have finally gained permission from the department at Washington to close on Thanksgiving. Business will be suspended in all departments, just as on Sundays, and there will be no mail deliveries."

### Railroad Offices to Close Thursday

At railroad headquarters in the city there will be a general observance of Thanksgiving, the offices being closed during the entire day. Out on the lines the only observance of the day will be in the dining cars, where sumptuous meals will be served, turkey being on every menu.

### Will Urge Uniform Lines for All New Additions to City

They are considering recommending an ordinance that would prevent the laying out and selling of new additions of the city until the grade has been established and drainage and other important matters considered.
