HANISH FOUND GUILTY OF SENDING NAUGHTY **BOOKS AGAINST LAW**

Cult of Sun Worshipers' Leader is Found Guilty by Federal Jury at Chicago.

TRAPPED BY POSTAL INSPECTOR

Penalty Five Years in Pen, Five Thousand Fine or Both.

MATTER HELD OBJECTIONABLE

CHICAGO, Nov. 28. - Ottoman Zent Adusht Hanish, "high priest of Mazdaznan" and leader of the Mazdaznan cult of sun worshipers, said to number about 14,000 in different cities, was found guilty by a federal jury here today of sending objectionable literature by express in violation of the interstate commerce laws. He may be sentenced to five years' imprisonment, to pay a \$5,000 fine, or both.

The verdict brands as unfit for circulation the text book of the cult. The book was read to the jury and almost no other evidence was offered by either eide. The frank and lengthy treatise on sex rela-

The jury was out three hours. Hanish was trapped by Dana Angier, a postal inspector, who wrote from Brookfield. Mo., asking for a copy of the text book of the cult giving the fictious name of "Julia B. Gardner." Hanish sent the book by express to avoid conflict with postal regulations.

Burning of incense, songs to Mazdaznan and alloged Persian hymns by persons supposed to be members of the cult were features of the trial and kept court balliffs busy suppressing such demonstra tions in court and the corridor outside. Well dressed women were prominent among the cult devotees and held their places throughout the trial, though Judge Mack suggested that all retire during the

Trial of Dr. Craig for Murder Begun

SHELBYVILLE, Ind., Nov. 28 .- Little time was wasted in preliminarets at the opening of the trial today of Dr. William B. Craig for the murder of Dr. Helen E. Knabe. The usual motion to quash the indictment was overruled and examination of prospective purors then was begun. It was apparent from questions asked by attorneys for the prosecu tion that the trial was expected to last a long time.

Dr. Craig arrived from Indianapolis early, accompanied by his 14-year-old daughter Marion. They proceeded to the court house at once, where the accused man's five lawyers were awaiting him The two listened attentively to the exmination of veniremen. The prosecutor asked the veniremen if they would be willing to convict on circumstantial evi-

usintance with "any woman doctors of indianapolis." Neither did any of them know Harry C. Webster, the private detective, who is supposed to be the principal witness for the prosecution.

WILL COST MILLION TO REPLACE WRECKED SEWER

PITTSBURGH. Pa., Nov. 28.-Steam shavels were today employed in tearing up the remants of the nine foot sewer wrecked for a mile in the Lawrenceville district by an explosion of gas last Wednesday. Debris has clogged the channel and sewage and water backing up has undermined the walls of a brew-ery so that it was in danger of falling Two hundred employes were hurriedly driven into the street by city inpectors. Director of Public Works John Herron announced today that the city would replace the wrecked sewer with an adequate tunnel at a cost of \$1,000,000.

New York Realty Concern Bankrupt

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.-The New York Real Esate Security company, with large realty holdings of office buildings and apartment houses, was forced into bankruptcy today by creditors with claims for balances due on the purchase of bonds. The assets, consisting of equities in mortgaged real estate and rent due, are stated in the bankruptcy petition to approximate \$100,000. The company financed its real estate dealings through the sale of 6 per cent bonds throughout the country. Attorneys for the concern said that its embarrassment was only temporary.

The value of the property against which the company's bonds have been issued is said to total between \$20,000,000 and \$25,009,000 and, according to counsel the proceedings against the company were instituted as a friendly action to protect the bondholders. The concern is capitalized at \$3,950,000.

Carranza Says He Will March Into Conquered State at Head of an Army.

EXPECTS FALL OF THE CAPITAL Will Start Soon as News of Its Capture is Received.

Head of Constitutional Forces Had Relative Shot in the Presence of Mother Pleading for His Release.

HERMOSILLO, Mexico, Nov. 27 .- (Via Nogales, Sonora, Nov. 28.) - General Venustiano Carranza said today that his projected trip into Chihuahua state would not be made through the United States even if permission were granted by the Washington government. He said he expected to make the hard cross-country march between Agua Prieta and Juarez with a column of troops and not with a small escort, as when he made his trip from Conhulla to Sonora.

When he expected to make the journey the constitutionalist commander doclined to say, but it was believed that no move would be made until he expected capture of the Chihuahua state capital. Insurgent forces will continue the investment of Mazatlan, seaport in Sincles, and Guaymas, the guif port of Sonora, which are the only important points held by the Huerta troops in the northwest. Reports of two fresh victories to the south arrived tonight at Carranza's beadquarters here from Rosario, Sinalos. It was reported that Colonel Rafaci Buelna defeated a strong column of federals at Santia on November 34. The ions on both sides was given as 100 killed.
