ADVISES COURSE IN HYGIENE

Special Committee Makes Report to Association.

STUDY PHYSICAL EDUCATION

William E. Jarvis, Former Organizer for Owls, Files Suit for Two Thousand Against Lodge Officers.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)
DES MOINES, Nov. 28.—(Special Telegram.)—The special committee on high school science course of study for the Central Association of Science and Mathematics Teachers in its report to the association, in session here, recommended teaching personal hygiene as a part of the subject of physiology.

The committee, Prof. James J. Smith of the Austin High school of Chicago, chairman, which was appointed a year ago to devise a course of high school science study, recommends that personal hygiene be introduced in the freshman year and concluded in the sophomore year. It advises a two-year course of physical education, making a complete course of instruction on the human body.

Lodge Organizer Sues.
William E. Jarvis, ousted from his office as organizer for the local order of Owls for alleged disloyalty to the order, today filed suit to recover the sum of \$2,000. Jarvis alleges he has been deprived to that amount through the alleged violation of his contract by the local lodge. C. A. Horner, Jesse Acklin and Jacob G. Beck, trustees, and G. A. Kenderline, deputy supreme president of the order for Iowa, are named defendants in the action. All of them are prominent lodge men.

Inquiry Into Health Conditions.
The State Board of Health is entering upon a campaign for securing all possible information relating to sanitary conditions in the cities of the state and especially with reference to drainage and water. The last legislature directed the state board to "use all means at its command to make special effort to improve the sanitation and health conditions" of the state and appropriated money to be used in the employment of persons to enforce sanitation where local boards are unwilling to co-operate. The board hopes to be able to use this money also in making the investigation and especially in making analyses of water in the various cities. Special attention is to be given to pollution of the streams. Already the board has secured maps of various cities showing the drainage districts and information as to garbage disposal and other matters and the work has but just started. There is some complaint in some cities because of the failure to have this work done in other years.

Plan to Change Insurance Laws.
It is known that for the first time in the history of legislation on the subject of insurance the old line companies and the mutuals have reached an agreement in favor of the repeal of the Iowa law which forbids combinations for the making of rates in insurance. For a long time the old line companies have been moving to have the law repealed. They claim that as a matter of fact the law prevents them doing business in the state at fair rates and as a result the Iowa companies are being driven to the wall. But the mutuals have always held out for the law. Now, at a recent meeting of the association of mutuals, they came out strongly for a repeal of the law and a new statute forbidding rate cutting or deviation from the established rates made by some central authority. It is therefore expected that in the near future the anti-compact law will be repealed.

Favor Iowa Building at Exposition.
A representative of the San Francisco exposition, entering in the state and engaged in visiting various commercial clubs and booster organizations, with a view to raising funds, in some way, that Iowa may have representation at the exposition, two years hence. It is proposed that a meeting be held in Des Moines at an early date for the purpose of interesting the business men of the state in the enterprise. The legislature refused to make any appropriation for a building, but authorized the city of Waterloo to erect a building for the state, if desired. But the Waterloo scheme failed, also. Now it is planned to raise money by popular subscription and make an Iowa exhibit.

Thorne and Ripley Correspond.
Chairman Clifford Thorne of the Iowa railroad commission, and E. P. Ripley, president of the Santa Fe railroad, continue their correspondence regarding railroad values and the possible benefits to be derived from government ownership. In his last letter to Ripley, the Iowa chairman states that in addition to the benefits of direct profits from the railroad operation, the public would, under government ownership, secure an immense profit in the increased value of the lands owned by the railroads. For instance, the lands of the Northern Pacific represent one-fifth of its entire value. Very much of the increase of value on some of the roads in Iowa was represented by lands. The public would secure whatever of increase there might be as to these.

Anticipate Increase in Rates.
J. H. Henderson, commerce counsel for Iowa, returned today from Washington, where as a member of the committee looking after rate matters, he attended the preliminary hearing on the proposal of eastern railroads for a 5 per cent increase in all their rates. The railroad companies have started out with a strong showing and it seems certain that, unless something new is turned up in the case, that the commission will grant the increased rates in the east. This will be followed, in the opinion of the railroad commissioners, with a case to secure an advance in rates in the west.

Affects Thirty-Five Other Laws.
The petition for rehearing in the Des Moines saloon case indicates that if the rule as applied here is to prevail, then there are thirty-five other acts of the legislature legalizing various official acts, that will go to the discard if they are attacked. The court held that the legislature has no right to legalize the acts of a notary where the act of the notary is a part of a contract or agreement and essential to the same. A great many legalizing acts have covered the same ground and never before have been questioned.

Only Elopement, is Plea of Kidnaper

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 28.—Claiming that there was a "miscarriage of justice" in the sentencing of Earl Jones, a Corning, Ia., musician, to the penitentiary for five years on the charge of having kidnaped Miss Grace Runyan, a daughter of a Corning banker, his attorneys today filed a petition for his release with the State Board of Control. Jones was sentenced on his plea of guilty, but his attorneys allege that he made the plea under pressure from the girl's father and that his case was simply an elopement.

The alleged kidnaping took place about a month ago and in less than two weeks Jones was in the penitentiary.

Bride Who Stole from Rockefeller Paroled

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—Mrs. Evelyn Rutherford, the young bride who clipped coupons from a batch of John D. Rockefeller's bonds and cashed them, to the amount of \$2,400, was given a suspended sentence today, after pleading guilty to grand larceny. She was instructed to report once a week for five years to probation officers and to lead a life of honesty, on penalty of several years imprisonment.

Mrs. Rutherford obtained possession of the coupons while employed as a clerk in the offices of the Southern Pacific Railway company. After her arrest she made restitution of the full amount.

RAIL ACCIDENTS INCREASE

Hundred Forty More Killed Than in Same Quarter Last Year.

FIFTY THOUSAND CASUALTIES

Derailments and Collisions Much More Numerous, but Great Percentage of Deaths is Not Due to Wrecks.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—The Interstate Commerce commission's accident bulletin issued today for the quarter ended June 30, 1913, shows that as compared with returns of the corresponding quarter of 1912, there was a total increase of 149 in the number of persons killed and of 8,280 in the number injured in railroad accidents of all kinds in the United States. There was an increase of 134 in the number of train accidents.
Defective roadway and defective equipment caused more than 30 per cent of all derailments reported, 35.1 per cent being caused by broken rails.
The total number of casualties in all classes of accidents incident to railroad during the quarter was 2,333 killed and 68,811 injured. Of these totals, 2,296 and 68,211 injured, respectively, were killed and injured in other than train accidents, including accidents to employees while at work, to passengers getting on or off cars and to trespassers.
The total number of collisions and derailments reported for the quarter was 6,990, of which 144 collisions and 292 derailments affected passenger trains. The financial damage caused by the accidents was \$1,244,250, a material increase over the returns for the corresponding quarter of 1912.

SHANK QUILTS JOB AS MAYOR

Resigns as Result of Threats of Impeachment.

HIS ACTION NOT A SURPRISE

Has Stated He Would Retire in Event of Another Walkout—Did Not Want Cops to Ride Cars with Breakers.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 28.—Samuel Lewis Shank resigned as mayor of Indianapolis this afternoon. The resignation is the result of labor troubles in the city and a threat of impeachment proceedings by a committee of business men unless further disorders were averted. Harry R. Wallace, city controller, succeeded to the mayor's chair.

Mr. Shank tendered his resignation after he had conferred with a number of Union labor officials regarding an impending strike of teamsters, who told him there was little hope of averting the strike. Mayor Shank announced Wednesday that he would resign if the threatened strike could not be stopped.

Shank was waited on by a committee of business men Tuesday night and was informed that impeachment proceedings against him were being prepared and would be filed today if the impending teamsters strike could not be averted.

Mayor Shank's attitude during the recent street car strike, when he let it ride on the cars manned by strike breakers, caused the resignation of Superintendent of Police Martin J. Hyland and President William E. Davis, of the Board of Public Safety.
At the first police roll call after the police chief's resignation, Mayor Shank made a speech, in which he said he did not wish the patrolmen to ride on wagons driven by non-union teamsters, if a strike occurred. This statement, it is said, resulted in the beginning of preparations to file impeachment proceedings against the mayor.

Car Turns Over and Two Women May Die

SIOUX CITY, Ia., Nov. 28.—Mrs. Thomas W. Gribble and her 13-year-old daughter, living near Dakota City, Neb., were probably fatally injured and Miss Lillian Johnson and Ray Harber received broken bones when the Gribble motor car turned over last night five miles southwest of Dakota City, Neb.
Carroll, 4-month-old son of Mrs. Gribble, who was resting in his mother's arms, was hurt twenty feet and escaped uninjured.
Mrs. Gribble is the wife of Thomas W. Gribble, one of the richest farmers of Dakota county.

REBEL CHIEF PLANS OVERLAND TRIP INTO STATE OF CHIHUAHUA

and that of General Rabago is still unknown here.
The constitutionalist troops entered Victoria during the afternoon of November 19, after the federal troops had evacuated the city which they had defended stoutly for three days. The rebels, it is said, at once started pillaging, setting fire to houses and murdering citizens. Private residences, as well as stores and government offices, were sacked, and a number of Spanish residents were killed, including, it is said, the Spanish consul.
A further movement of rebel troops from the district of Victoria toward Tampico is reported in messages received through railroad agents. The telegraph wires were cut today at Gonzalez about sixty miles northwest of Tampico. Train service between Tampico and Victoria has been suspended.
American cotton in limited quantities is to be admitted into Mexico free of duty unless railroad communication with the Tuxtepec cotton district be restored within a week according to a statement made by the minister of fomento, Leopoldo Rebolledo. The object of this measure is to tranquillize the textile workers, who see destitution staring them in the face owing to threatened closing of the cotton mill because of the lack of raw cotton. Only such quantities of American cotton as are necessary to provide for the temporary needs of the industry are to be permitted to enter free.

Troops Ordered to El Paso.
SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 28.—Fort Douglas was the scene of busy preparations today for the departure of the Twentieth United States infantry to El Paso, Texas. Orders to proceed to the fort were received yesterday and it is expected the troops will depart tomorrow, this being contingent upon the transportation facilities, bids for which were made today. The regiment numbers 73 enlisted men and fifty officers. Only about a dozen men will be left in charge of the post.

Ordered to Vera Cruz.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Secretary Daniels today ordered Rear Admiral Badger, commander-in-chief of the Atlantic fleet, to send the battleships Connecticut, Kansas and Ohio of the Fourth division from Mediterranean ports to the east coast of Mexico as relief for the Louisiana, Michigan and New Hampshire of the Second division. The Fourth division will sail for Mexico on December 1 and probably will reach Vera Cruz about December 20 or 21.

At the navy department it was said today that the Louisiana, Michigan and New Hampshire would leave for home ports immediately on the arrival of the vessels from the Mediterranean.
The battleship New Hampshire is due in Vera Cruz today from Tuxpan.
