At the meeting of the council in committee of the whole City Treasurer W. G. Ure said he believed this company had done "all the blood-letting of which they are capable," but he thought if the city wanted to agree with them and "call them off." a basis for an agreement should be considered.

Klopp Makes New Move to Regain the Control of Plant

Aaron T. Klopp, founder and president of the Klopp-Bartlett printing company, who, in recent injunction proceedings in district court, alleged that Josiah B. Redfield and Harvey E. Milliken, members of the board of directors, had conspired to prevent him from having a voice in the management, has begun new legal move to regain his lost position. In a petition he relates to the district court that he was induced to consent to changing the company's article of incorporation by erroneous legal advice and asks that the old articles be re-

Mr. Klopp alleges that, although no solder of preferred stock had ever claimed the right to participate in the management of the company, in August of this year Redfield informed him that he would claim such right and that an opinion written by Jefferis & Tunison, regular attorneys for the firm, said that the holders of preferred stock had this Thompsen, the former owner, is to take a farm in Iowa belonging to Nestadek asserts, he consented to changes in the articles of incorporation, which have caused him to lose his salary and all control of the business. He asserts that Milliken knew that in fact the holders of common stock alone were entitled to control the business and the legal opinion was erroneous.

The plaintiff asks that the court set aside the new articles of incorporation and that the company be required to issúe common and preferred stock to the former holders under the old articles. If this is done by the court, Mr. Klopp will regain control of the business, since he held a majority of the common stock.

Agitation for a Nebraska terminal a Omaha had been on for many months, but it was less than three weeks ago that this resulted in there being signed at Washington a lease for space in the Burlington station, there having been difficulty in settling upon the station that was to house the terminal.



A new sample house in Omaha, offerng country merchants an opportunity to order from factory agents their line of merchandise to compete with mail order houses, was authorized by the directors and stockholders of the Merchants' Syndicate Catalogue company at a meeting at the Paxton hotel.

The concern, which is made up largely of Omaha or former Omaha men, is the originator of the "Home Trade Price Maker," a catalogue of goods to be shipped direct from factories to small merchants in competition with mail order tinde. The enterprise is generally known as the "Omaha idea" in merchandise distribution, because the company is a Nebraska corporation, organized in Omaha everal years ago.

The new Omaha house is intended to rollow a similar permanent sample exposition to be established at Chicago, the eadquarters of the company, next spring. 
