NO NEW BOARD IS NAMED

Governor Has Not Replaced State Veterinarians.

DAVIS CASE AS YET UPPERMOST

Outsiders Say the Examiners Are Unwilling to Admit New Doctors for Fear of Overcrowding Lucrative Field.

LINCOLN, Dec. 3.—(Special.)—While it was given out that the state veterinary board would appoint a board of examiners the first of this week, nothing so far has been done, and there is much speculation who will be appointed.

While there has been some criticism of the present examiners it is general conceded that they have done good work and most of the criticism comes from those who would like to see an entirely new board appointed. Mr. Anderson of Seward, Dr. Sprague of David City and Dr. Tuck of Weping Water compose the old board and it is understood they will not feel at all bad if they are relieved of the work, which has been had for each member has suffered a great financial loss in time and practice because of the work of examination.

Everything seemed to be going along smoothly until a week or so ago when Governor Morehead and Secretary of State Wait, members of the state board, on recommendation of State Veterinarian Klean, issued a certificate to Mr. Davis, who had taken the examination before the examiners and failed to pass. Davis claimed that the board had been partial in their examinations and that it had been their practice not to pass new applicants for veterinary certificates because they wished to keep down the number of veterinarians in the state in the interests of those already holding certificates.

Why Governor Acted.

He cited as an instance the examination held at the time he lost out and showed that out of twelve applicants only one passed. On such a showing the governor and secretary of state issued a permit under the heads of the examining board. The question now arises if the other ten who also failed are not just as much entitled to permits as Davis, and cannot they receive certificates upon application to the board.

One man in the state house said this morning that it seemed strange that with as many good veterinarians as there are in Nebraska it should be necessary to appoint an Illinois veterinarian as state veterinarian and that upon his recommendation his partner, who had failed to pass the regular examination, should be passed over the heads of an examining board and also over Nebraska veterinarians who do not think that the change of Davis that the board denigrated turned down applicants is justified by the records which show that in the last two years a large number of certificates have been signed by members of the board.

Section 7 of the law says "the board may refuse to issue a certificate or may cancel one already issued for any of the following causes: The employment of fraud or deception in applying for a certificate; or in passing examination provided for in this act; conviction of crime involving immoral turpitude; habitual intemperance, etc., but no where in the law does it give the board power to

Rush Work on Bridge.

The Burlington railroad expects to have its work on the Ashland bridge completed before the spring freshets come, and will keep a force of men at work all winter placing the piers. The bridge will be considerably higher than formerly and will stand on cement piers, which rest on bedrock.

Commissioners May Take Trip.

It may be necessary for representatives of the state railway commission to go to Washington to attend a session of the interstate-commerce commission on next Monday. The application of railroads to increase the rate on bananas from the Gulf of Mexico to Nebraska is the cause of trip if it should be taken.

Faulty Grammar Jars Lincoln Professors

LINCOLN, Dec. 3.—(Special.)—The Lincoln Traction company has stepped outside the influence of good grammar by posting on its trolley wires near all school houses the admonition to "Go Slow."

Now the Lincoln Auto club has fallen under a ban by placing on telephone poles near the school houses of the city boards on which is painted "Go slow. Public school next block."

University professors are criticizing the public showing in a known far and wide as an educational center. They say that the signs should be pulled down and others put up with the notation "Go slowly," placed thereon.

The state legislation may be called upon to correct the evil of ignorance in educational centers by the passage of a law which will fix the situation.

ARTHUR COUNTY FARMERS TO UTILIZE CROP WASTE

LINCOLN, Dec. 3.—(Special.)—According to information received by the Board of Agriculture, farmers in Arthur county are preparing to prevent waste on the farms in that region by utilizing potatoes that cannot be marketed.

Many of the producers of Arthur county are far removed from a suitable market. For this reason thousands of bushels of potatoes are wasted each year. The farmers have conceived the idea of manufacturing denatured alcohol from the waste. Twenty-five farmers have banded themselves together to erect a denatured alcohol factory.

A change has been made in the denatured alcohol law and after January, 1914, farmers are allowed the privilege of manufacturing the product from the waste of the farm.

It is estimated that denatured alcohol can be made from potatoes at a cost of between 20 and 25 cents a gallon.

ALLEGED BOOTLEGGERS ARRESTED AT HOLDREGE

HOLDREGE, Neb., Dec. 2.—(Special.)—

Chief of Police Bailey, with Officers Smith and Porter and Sheriff Anderson, arrested seven persons for alleged raid and all were landed in jail in less than an hour.

Alfred Abrahamson, Jud Olson, Ike Christensen, Lou McKenzie, Robert Johnson, Henry Williams and Jennie Laiter are the persons arrested. All but Jackson and Williams, who were colored men, are out on bail. All are bound over to the district court.

At the home of Alfred Abrahamson, who is a drayman, Chief of Police Bailey found only a little fire water in the "usual place," but upon searching the hayloft he located large quantities of whisky and beer hidden in the hay.

The officers have been working on the case for some time, but have been slow in making the arrests so as to do it on the wholesale basis.

ALLEGED GAMBLERS ARRESTED AT MERNA

BROKEN BOW, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)—

Charged with gambling, J. A. James of Grand Island, Silver, Crist of Anselmo, Tom and Charles Sweeney of Merna, were taken before Justice G. Schwid of this city and bound over to the district court in the sum of \$500 each. The game was raided last Saturday night in a private house at Merna. Sheriff Wilson and Constable Towles making the arrests. In effecting an entrance the officers discovered seven players grouped about a table covered with a quilt. In the confusion that followed the lamp was upset and three of the players succeeded in making a getaway. When the accused appeared before the justice they waived preliminary hearing and were accordingly bound over. Bonds were furnished by friends.

Morehead Accepts Heat for Mansion

LINCOLN, Dec. 3.—(Special.)—Governor Morehead has reneged on his campaign promise not to accept anything from the state of Nebraska but his salary, and as a result the state will furnish heat for the mansion.

When the governor took charge of affairs of state he wanted it distinctly understood that all bills outside of salary would be paid by him, as he did not believe the governor ought to accept anything outside the salary paid. As a general thing the executive has kept his promise to the people not to accept extras given to other governors.

Last winter the governor paid the coal bills of the mansion and never made a kick. It was a hard, cold winter, and the executive salary looked mighty small when the coal man got through presenting bills. With the experience of last winter in mind, he has faltered and today the Board of Public Lands and Funds awarded a contract to George W. Wente of Lincoln to install connection with the state house heating plant so that the mansion may be heated at state expense. The cost of the connection will be \$245.

Wealthy Mexican Executed by Rebels

HERMOSILLO, Mex., Dec. 3.—A wealthy Mexican resident of Sinaloa was shot to death here early today by a firing squad of insurgent soldiers. He was Antonio V. Gaballero, convicted of plotting against the constitutional government of his state.

It was at the darkest hour, just before dawn, when Gaballero was placed against a wall of sun-baked brick, facing the cemetery where his body now rests.

The prisoner walked alone to the wall, received the blessings of a priest and placed the executioner's bandage over his eyes with his own hands.

"Mark well the heart," he said. "Nothing was visible to the marksmen except the silhouette of his shirt sleeves and the white bandage over the head."

The firing squad moved to within ten feet of their human mark and the five rifles fired as one.

UNIVERSITY HEADS TO MEET

Session Called for Lincoln Nineteenth of January to Consider Matter Brought Up by Kansas Men.

LINCOLN, Dec. 3.—A meeting of the heads and governing boards of universities in the Missouri Valley conference has been called for Lincoln, January 19, to consider the problem of allowing one foot ball game each season to be played off a university campus. The meeting has been called as a result of Kansas alumni in Kansas City, who have petitioned Chancellor Strong of the University of Kansas to have the annual Kansas-Missouri game moved to Kansas City. The proposition interests Nebraska inasmuch as Omaha, having probably more graduates than any place in the state, has frequently petitioned to have one game played in that city. Other minor matters may be considered at the Lincoln meeting.

Former grand champions have been slaughtered at the stock yards and the meat sold at auction. Choice steaks have been offered for sale by scores of butchers. It has been estimated that to supply all these cuts of blue ribbon meat, an animal weighing as much as a battleship would be required.
