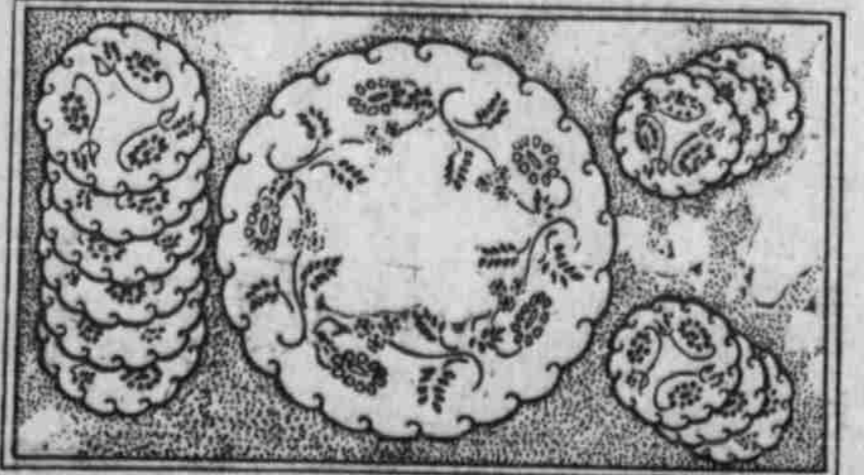

POSSE CANNOT FIND LOPEZ
Larger Portion of Gas-Flooded Mine is Searched.
RELIEF THAT HE HAS ESCAPED

Workings are clear of flames except a few blind stopes, which are filled with deadly black damp.

BINGHAM, Utah, Dec. 6.—Still hopeful that the body of Ralph Lopez, slayer of six men, would be found in Utah after his escape from the mine, the posse searched the workings in the thirty miles of underground workings were penetrated, but as the day advanced no word reached the waiting crowds at the tunnel mouth to dissipate their belief that the desperado had escaped.

The poisonous gases, driven into the mine from Monday until Thursday night, were cleared from the workings today with the exception of a few blind stopes, where the heavy and deadly black damp generated by burning wet gunpowder, still hung. However, it was thought that by late today the searchers would be able to penetrate every part of the mine. The cave-in that was found yesterday, blocking a blind stope in the Parnell tunnel, was to be opened today, although there was little hope Lopez had again hidden behind to avoid the gases.

Since November 21 Lopez has killed five peace officers who pursued him after he had killed a fellow Mexican.

FARMERS WORK STEAM ROLLER
Delegation from Omaha to Elkhorn Convention Snowed Under.
ELECTING FAIR DIRECTORS

Old Fight of the Douglas County Agricultural Society is Revived at Annual Meeting at Elkhorn.

The country faction of Douglas county put on its war paint yesterday afternoon and picketed the course of a very efficient steam roller which completely overran the Omaha faction at the section of the Board of Commissioners of the Douglas County Agricultural Society, at the annual meeting at Elkhorn. The old feud, with one exception, was re-elected with the count standing about 20 to 20, although the Omaha band put up a strong and animated fight which was augmented by considerable speech making and argument.

The election of the board of commissioners has always been more or less a bone of contention between the Omaha faction and the country element, and neither side can agree on any point. The county fair has always been held in Omaha as a part of the Ak-Sar-Bon festivities, but last year the country men used all their influence to have the fair held at Florence under the pretext that the conditions were more favorable for live stock. Their arguments along that line were overruled, so they got revenge at the annual election.

The county commissioners and the board of governors of Ak-Sar-Bon and many interested Omahans went to Elkhorn in the interests of the Omaha candidates, but the farmers had their roller in excellent condition and it brooked no opposition.

The only man who was not re-elected was James Walsh. A. B. Agas was elected in his place. The following are the re-elected officials: William Stake-maker, Herbas Rossig, William Eike, E. C. Longman, L. Handerson, E. C. Headman, George Dierka, J. P. McArdle, Charles Witte, Peter Hoeseld, J. H. Taylor and W. P. Banc.

Trains Are Stalled in the Snowdrifts

TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 6.—Two Union Pacific passenger trains and one Rock Island train were stalled in the snow drifts of Colorado today, according to reports received at the local offices of the two roads. Union Pacific trains No. 29 and 108 were held up by drifts that fill the cuts between Denver and Lyman, Colo.; Rock Island train No. 27 at Watkins, Colo., was unable to move in either direction. A dining car is carried by each train and no suffering among the passengers was reported.

Ellis, Kan., on the Union Pacific, and Goodland, Kan., on the Rock Island, were western terminals of the two roads today. Between these cities and points in Colorado the rails were buried beneath several feet of snow.

At noon today it was snowing throughout northwestern Kansas. The drifts were piled high with a stiff northwest wind. Only local trains were being operated on the Union Pacific between Ellis and Kansas City. On the Rock Island a like service was maintained east of Goodland. Rotary snow plows and extra men were being assembled ready to fill the congested cuts as soon as the storm abates.

Judge Gibbons Will Resign if Tedford Is Sent to Prison

CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—Joshua Tedford, who has arisen to commercial prominence here in the seven years during which a mandate committing him to prison was misplaced, found a friend in Judge John Gibbons today.

"If the laws of this state are interpreted to mean that this redeemer man must go to prison, I will resign from the bench," said the judge.

He added that if necessary he would be glad to issue a writ of habeas corpus for Tedford, unless the latter were proved to have been implicated in misplacing the mandate. Thus far the state's attorney has taken no action in the case.

Friends of Governor DuSmet who have interested themselves in the case have assured Tedford that he may rest easy and that the governor will pardon him formally as soon as the papers are prepared.

Three Hundred Union Teamsters Return to Work


INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 6.—Three hundred union teamsters who have been on strike since last Sunday midnight returned to work today and union officials say 1,000 will be back in their old places by Monday morning. Only those drivers whose employers have signed contracts with the union are permitted to take out teams, by the resolution adopted at yesterday's meeting of the teamsters.

Labor leaders declare that 300 employers have signed contracts agreeing to pay the union's scale and not discriminate against union men, but at the offices of the Vehicle Owners' association it was said none of the large employers had agreed to the union's demands.

Farmers Will Start Marketing Agency

LA CROSSE, Wis., Dec. 6.—After an all-night session the state convention of the American Society of Equity decided early today to establish at Madison a state marketing and business agency on a scale larger than heretofore attempted by the farmers anywhere in the country. Experts and auditors will be employed who will go into the price question on a scientific basis and will supply co-operative selling associations and other farmers with prices prevailing in all markets. Another duty will be to keep account of retail prices in each center so that the farmer may know at all times what his products are selling for to the consumer and how much of the retail price the middle man is getting.
