The insurance commissioner of Wisconsin has notified the Independent Order of Foresters of Toronto, Canada, which relinquished its state license last month, that it has assigned "no valid reason of proper purpose" in withdrawing from the state, and that its withdrawal will not be accepted. When the order surrendered its state license it stated that conditions in Wisconsin made it impossible for it to continue to do business in this state, and said that the withdrawal was intended "as a respectful protest against your unwarranted action relating to our recent readjustment legislation."




