CHURCHES HAVE BIG BAZAAR

Throngs Patronize Those Selling Gifts in Bee Building Rotunda.

LOTS OF HOME-MADE ARTICLES

Food Just Like Those "Mother Used to Make" on Sale at Reasonable Prices by Women of Several Congregations.

Crowds of men, women and children thronged the court of The Bee building from morning to dusk Monday to inspect the opening displays and purchase Christmas gifts from among the thousands of beautiful and useful articles offered for sale in The Bee's fifth annual bazaar of the churches.

Women of the Pearl Memorial Methodist Episcopal, St. Mary's Avenue Congregational, All Saints' Episcopal and Lowe Avenue Presbyterian churches have charge of the bazaar for Monday and Tuesday, after which other churches of the city will take turns in the booths.

The money raised goes to the various women's guilds and aid societies of the churches which are participating. The court of The Bee building is loaned free for the purpose.

An attractive odor of the delicious home-made doughnuts, cakes and cookies which are for sale permeates the large court, which is appropriately decorated with holly, flags, banners and flowers.

Candies, jellies and preserves are offered temptingly by pretty young women behind some of the counters, while beautiful fancy-work, hand-painted china, toys and dolls cover other tables.

Calendars, brass and leather goods, hand-made rugs, embroidered quilts and many articles of wearing apparel or household use are also on display and find a ready sale.

Business Rushing. Small change was almost at a premium because of the rushing business which confronted the women throughout the day.

Many business men who visited the bazaar merely out of curiosity, did not leave until they had made purchases, because the variety of the display at reasonable prices offered an easy solution of the Christmas program.

One of the most interesting of the articles on sale is a wonderful bedspread, hand embroidered in a conventional design of eyelets and solid work.

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Cox Explains Antics of Easter Tornado Before Local Court

Prof. Henry J. Cox of Chicago, federal weather expert, testifying for the defense in a suit in District Judge Estelle's court, in which the owner of the wrecked Idlewild pool hall, Twenty-fifth and Grand streets, is suing for fire insurance, explained the storm as being caused by the rushing of a great volume of air in to the vacuum center of the whirling monster and by the breaking and crushing of rocks.

"The noise was caused," he said, "by the tremendous force of air rushing in to fill a partial vacuum. A tornado is caused by unusual heat and increased moisture at some particular point in the atmosphere. The heated lighter air ascends and the air flows in from outside. By the movement of the earth the storm is given its rotary movement to the right."

According to Prof. Cox the terrifying black cloud that accompanies a tornado is directly above the whirling winds which wreck all in their path. He explained the tornado's freakish actions in leaving portions of its path untouched on the ground that there were various district whirls within the funnel with neutral zones between them and that some buildings were bombed by wreckage carried by the wind while others luckily escaped.

No Licenses for New Saloons Will Be Granted This Year

An agreement, it is understood, exists among city commissioners to the effect that no additional saloons will be licensed in the city next year. There is a rumor that certain saloonists will not receive a renewal of their licenses for various and obvious reasons and if the protests entered against these justify the council in refusing a license a new license may be granted for the same location.

The city council will sit as an excise board to pass upon applications for licenses to operate saloons next year the latter part of this week or the first of next, as the advertisement for the first applicants will expire Wednesday.

No protests have been received thus far against any of the existing saloons, but Gould Dietz has filed a protest against the application for a new saloon at 125 Farnam street and a protest will later be made against the applicant for another saloon at Twenty-fourth and Lake streets.

CLUB WOMEN WATCH TRIAL

Take Interest in Hearing of Girl Who Killed Her Lover.

IS NOT ACTION OF THE CLUBS

Admit They Expect to Enter a Protest if the Action of the Jury in the Case is Not to Their Likings.

"Woman, to the support of a wronged sister!" is the slogan which club women of Omaha will use in a battle of protest if the jury which is trying Sebastiano Soritto, the 21-year-old girl who killed her faithless lover, returns a verdict of guilty.

Representatives of various women's clubs throughout the city were among the first of the eager throngs which crowded the court room yesterday morning when the trial was begun.

While they have expressed confidence in their belief that the twelve men who are to determine the fate of the unwedded girl who killed the father of her child will invoke the unwritten law, they have seen

"We do not wish to have it understood," said Mrs. Hayes, "that we stand as questioning in advance the wisdom of the men who must dispose of this girl's case—we have, to the contrary, every confidence in them. Nor do we wish to give the impression that we are seeking to condone the offense of this unfortunate girl. It is, however, the general sentiment of the women of Omaha—and of the men, too, I believe—that the enormity of the murdered man's crime should be reckoned with also."

The club women admit that they will enter protest if the verdict is not to their liking.
