High says that in the light of the recent violations of the liquor laws of the state by many of the Omaha saloon men, the league will feel justified in protesting the renewal of their licenses. "We will probably make it hot for some of them," said High. "The petitions for licenses say that the applicant is a man of good moral character. Will a man of good moral character violate the laws of the state as recklessly as many of these fellows did. We will put it up to the council as to whether they will dare renew the licenses of some of these men who have been guilty of the most flagrant violations of the law."

MADE HONORARY PRESIDENT

Mrs. George Tilden So Honored by Trustees of Old People's Home.

MRS. EDWARD JOHNSON CHOSEN

Becomes Executive Head of Organization, but Will Look to Retiring Official for Much Guidance.

Mrs. George Tilden, who has served for fourteen consecutive years as president of the board of trustees of the Old People's Home, and for eight years previous to that served as treasurer, was made honorary president of the home at the thirtieth annual meeting held in the parlors of the North Presbyterian church. Mrs. Tilden was obliged to announce that she would not be a candidate for re-election as president because her health will not permit her to engage in active work. Mrs. Tilden is gradually retiring from various offices in various organizations of the city on that account. She is honorary president of the Young Women's Christian association, an office given her as a reward for many years' service as active president.

Other Officers Elected.

Mrs. Tilden thanked the board of trustees for presenting her with the honorary office and asked that they give her the privilege of attending all meetings, because she felt a part of the organization and wished to attend whenever her health would permit it. Mrs. Edward Johnson, who was elected president of the board, told the board of her thirteen years' active work alongside Mrs. Tilden and said that she knew that she would not be the real president of the board because she would always look to Mrs. Tilden for instructions because no one could be the executive head as long as Mrs. Tilden was alive. Mrs. George B. Eddy was elected vice president of the home; Mrs. S. K. Spalding, treasurer; Mrs. J. C. Hammond, corresponding secretary; Mrs. J. W. Gill, recording secretary. The following were elected to the board of trustees: For three years, Mrs. J. W. Bedford, Mrs. C. R. Sherman, Mrs. E. H. Loomis, Mrs. Cadet Taylor and Mrs. S. K. Spalding; for two years, Mrs. H. Adams, Mrs. J. W. Gill, Mrs. Edward Johnson, Mrs. A. B. Jacquith and Mrs. R. S. Wilcox; for one year, Mrs. J. C. Hammond, Mrs. George B. Eddy, Mrs. Frank Martin, Mrs. G. H. Gillespie and Miss Alice Troxell. The following were elected as chairmen of the committees: Admission committee, Mrs. E. O. Loomis; board of managers, Mrs. J. W. Bedford; house committee, Mrs. J. W. Bedford; wardrobe and linen committee, Mrs. C. R. Sherman; outside repair committee, Mrs. Cadet Taylor. Miss Alice Troxell was elected to the position of clerk of the board of managers. Mrs. Jeff W. Bedford read the report of the board of managers for the year just passed. Mrs. J. C. Hammond read the report of the corresponding secretary and Mrs. J. W. Gill read the report of the recording secretary. Mrs. E. O. Loomis told of the activities of the admission committee. She announced that there were twenty-three inmates in the home in addition to two boarders. Three were admitted during this last year, while five had died. After a chicken luncheon in the basement of the church, the afternoon session was inaugurated at 3 o'clock. The most important of the reports read in the afternoon was that of the treasurer, Mrs. S. K. Spalding. She reported that the board lacked approximately \$50 to cover all expenses of the last year.
