

CORN HERE FROM THE EAST

Local Grain Market is Invading the Chicago Territory.

FARMERS MAKE MORE MONEY

South is Calling on This Market Continually for Grain for Feed and Milling, Boosting the Price Here.

Omaha again Monday led the world as a corn market, receiving 22 carloads against seventy-two at Chicago, thirty-nine at St. Louis and 159 at Kansas City.

In Omaha corn was selling practically at the same price as in Kansas City and St. Louis, with prices but a couple of cents behind Chicago on similar grades.

The corn that came to the Omaha market did not stay long. A goodly portion was sent south as soon as it went through the elevators.

As previously noted, Omaha is reaching right into Chicago territory and taking corn. A large consignment came in over the Northwestern from Dixon, Ill.

Railroad men assert that Omaha will continue to be the corn market for all Iowa and a large portion of western Illinois, so long as the grain continues to move into the south and southwest, where it is fed and milled.

Monday the Burlington, Rock Island, Milwaukee and Illinois Central roads all brought corn to the Omaha market from Illinois and Mississippi river points.

Grain men do not hesitate to say that the south must for all time be the local market for the corn coming to Omaha, and there is no getting away from the fact that grain grown all through this section of the central west must move into the gulf states.

That the grain of the future must come to this market instead of going to Chicago, grain men assert is the logical conclusion. To ship from Missouri river points and then back haul into the south they say would simply pile up freight charges and ultimately add to the price that the farmer and manufacturer would have to pay for the corn.

Entertains Robbers Without Knowing Who They Were

John C. Barry, Charles W. McAuley Will Plead Guilty to Charge of Counterfeiting

W. Harry McAuley, alleged leader of a gang of banknote counterfeiters who have operated in various sections of the middle west for the last three years and who was arrested at Oakland, Cal., December 2, has admitted his identity and, according to federal authorities, will plead guilty to a charge of passing counterfeit notes.

In charge of United States Deputy Marshal Herman, McAuley has arrived in Omaha and was lodged in the county jail. He was to have been tried at Hastings, but he has asked to have the case transferred here, promising, it is said, that he will plead guilty. Two of McAuley's former associates are serving penitentiary sentences, one at Fort Leavenworth and the other at McNeil's Island, the Washington state penitentiary.

Foster Pities Baby; Releases Its Parents

William Troth and wife, alias Mattie Pierce, arrested by Officers Pusanowski and Holden at Seventeenth and Davenport streets, and charged at the station with vagrancy, were arranged in police court, where evidence submitted by the arresting officers was to the effect that the husband has been "forcing his wife to walk the streets" and turn the money she made over to him.

When brought in the woman declared that her 3-year-old child was at home alone. Mastron Gibbons was sent to the bridge at Seventeenth and Davenport streets where she found the baby fast asleep.

The child was brought to the station and after a serious talk with the couple they were released by Judge Foster on receipt of the baby.

THREE HOMES ROBBED DURING MONDAY NIGHT

Three robberies, thought to have been perpetrated by the same gang, have been reported to the police. All occurred Monday night.

Wholesalers Who Sell at Retail Are to Have Licenses

Balloonists in the wholesale business, but who sell to retail trade over a bar, will be compelled to take out the \$100 license required of retailers, under a resolution passed by the city commission by a vote of six to one, Mayor Dahman voting in the negative.

Police Commissioner Ryder introduced the resolution. The city commissioners had met previously and discussed the advisability of the action. Half a dozen liquor dealers will be affected.

"The old fire and police board never enforced the law if there is any law covering this situation," said Commissioner Kurek. "They allowed the matter to drift along, and the city commission has felt that they should not be required to pay the license in the middle of the year."

Whether or not the city commission had failed to live up to the law in the matter was a question City Attorney John A. Rine would not answer.

"I haven't investigated," don't want to say," Rine declared.

Commissioner Ryder said the matter had probably been neglected, but after the first of the year "barrel" houses would be treated as they ought to be under the law, and that there would be no discrimination between the man who sells over a bar at retail and pays only a wholesale license, and the man who caters to the retail trade only.

Only those dances will be on the program that have been approved by the leading clubs of the city, such as the Castle walk, the hesitation waltz and the one-step. The music will be the bright sort to which these are danced and which have made them so popular. There will be two orchestras alternating through the evening.

One of these will play the music for the special dances by Miss Sweet of Chicago, who will open the ball.

Miss Macee of the City Mission, which will be the beneficiary of this entertainment, is overjoyed at the prospect. Webster Donates Strip of Land to City for Carter Park

John H. Webster, representing the Omaha Bridge and Terminal Railway company, has donated a strip of land, 395 feet wide and a quarter of a mile long, to Carter Lake park. This strip of land, to which the city had failed to secure title, split the park in two, and when Park Commissioner Hummel took up the matter with Mr. Webster the land was at once donated to the city without charge.

WILL WARN STUDENTS TO WATCH THEIR HEALTH

Pasting stickers into all school books in Dodge county, with rules for good health printed thereon, is the anti-tuberculosis service to be accomplished with the sale of Red Cross Christmas seals in that locality, according to information received from Fremont by Mrs. K. R. J. Edholm, executive secretary in the crusade against the white plague.

Much goods has been accomplished in past years from school room instruction as to how to avoid consumption and other contagious diseases, and the Red Cross seal money in Dodge county will be used to further that kind of work during the next year. The health rules to be pasted into school books consist chiefly of "don'ts" in regard to possible contagion through the mouth and nose.

DR. STOOKEY QUILTS BELLEVUE

Head of the Presbyterian College Announces His Intention.

SAYS REACHES HIS LIMIT

Would Turn Over Task to Some One Who May Carry It Onward and Upward to a Higher Plane.

Dr. S. W. Stookey, president of Bellevue college, announced yesterday after chapel to the faculty and student body that he will resign as the official head of the school.

Dr. Stookey gave as his reasons that he believed that he has now accomplished all that it is possible for him to achieve in the upbuilding of the school and suggested that some other man of more energy could carry the institution to still a higher plane than he can.

His expressed appreciation for the assistance given him by the faculty and the students and promised to do all he could towards helping them from the outside, but wished to be relieved of the duty attending the office of president.

Dr. Stephen W. Stookey came to Bellevue from Cedar Rapids, Ia., where he was dean of the faculty of Coe college, one of the prominent western Presbyterian schools.

He came here to be president of the University of Omaha. With him came Dr. H. H. Maynard, also from Coe college, to have charge of the finances of the University of Omaha. It was at the time the Bellevue board of trustees determined to work out the destiny of the college through a large Protestant university in the city of Omaha, hence the title University of Omaha.

Differences Arise. But not many months after the coming of Drs Stookey and Maynard, differences of opinion arose as to the wisdom of the university project and eventually a division in the board, which resulted in the return of most of the old board members, with Dr. Stookey, to the college idea.

Dr. Stookey and Dr. Maynard parted. Dr. Stookey believing with the late Henry T. Clark, founder of Bellevue, and others of the board, that the

CO-OPERATING TO DISPOSE OF FEDERAL COURT DOCKET

In order that the remaining cases on the United States district court docket for this term may be disposed of within a few days, Judge Thomas C. Munger of Lincoln will hold court in the north court room, beginning Wednesday morning.

Besides the Brantley case, which is being heard in the south court room before Judge Page Morris of Duluth, only a few civil cases remain. That of R. E. Bonine against the Iowa-Nebraska Public Service company will be the first case to be heard by Judge Munger. The plaintiff claims \$20,000 for injuries alleged to have been sustained December 11, 1912, when, as a stationary engineer, he was employed by the defendant company at Missouri Valley, Ia.
