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## HEAVY COYOTE SCHEDULE

Prospect of Many Big Games for South Dakota.

## GOOD TEAM ALSO IN PROSPECT

Blackfield of Veterans Will Be Instruct and Chance that Fast Men Will Replace Those Going Out.

VERMILION, S. D., Dec. 10.—(Special.)—South Dakota's 1914 foot ball schedule promises to be a hummer, such a one in fact as probably no school of its size ever attempted before, including Minnesota, Notre Dame, Denver, Creighton and possibly Michigan and Nebraska.

As in previous years, home games with big teams will be the great draw, because it is impossible to finance big contests on Dakota field. Notre Dame was met this year on a two-year basis, and will be brought into western territory next fall, though whether at Sioux City or Sioux Falls has not been determined.

A number of Sioux Falls citizens are very anxious that this game, the biggest that South Dakota has ever brought home, should be played on Queen City soil. It is possible that Nebraska and South Dakota will meet, although not definitely determined.

The Minnesota date will be kept as in years past, although it has been felt locally that if the boys could meet the Gophers in late or middle season their chances would be increased. Denver will be played at Denver and Creighton again Thanksgiving at Omaha.

There is little chance that another contest will be staged with the Michigan Aggies. Of the teams to be met, Nebraska, Notre Dame and Minnesota will certainly be of western championship caliber. The 1913 Coyote backfield will be intact, as will the ends, but Captain Brown, Willy and King will be missing from the line. Potts may be back and is still eligible for another year.

## BOWLING TOURNAMENT ENDS

One Important Change When Pueblo Man Takes Third in Singles.

## TWO GO ABOVE SIX HUNDRED

Fourteen Hundred and Twenty Players Take Part and Scores of Cities Represented on Alleys.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 10.—(Special Telegram.)—Bowling on the five-man flat day of the Midwest Bowling tournament produced but one important change. This was in the singles where P. Wolf came all the way from Pueblo, Colo., to capture third place, scoring 65. His team was due in St. Louis Monday, but was snowed out in a blizzard and did not get in until this morning. The team itself was not as fortunate as Wolf as it was not even in the money, its score being but 2,461. The lowest score which was collected in the tournament in this division was 2,520.

Outside of Wolf but one man in the singles got above the six century mark today, this being D. Steele.

The tournament closed tonight after two weeks' play. Fourteen hundred and twenty players participated and more than a score of cities were represented. Checks for prizes aggregating \$5,000 will be mailed to the winners within a few days.

## High Men in Doubles.

In the doubles the best score was the 1,190 of Pierce and Wolf of Pueblo, but this was too low to get any part of the money worth mentioning. Compilation of the scores and figures on the division of the money were completed in the five-men team class. The O'Learys of Chicago took first money in this division, their 2,813 getting them \$250. The Hyde Park of St. Louis came second with 2,805 and collected \$25. Third money fell to the Wooster Lumber, also of St. Louis this club getting an even \$200.

## Denies Athletics Have Deserted the Players' Fraternity

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—President David L. Fultz of the Base Ball Players' Fraternity, issued a statement tonight denying the report that the Philadelphia Athletics as a team or as individuals had deserted the fraternity.

Fultz said:  
Contrary to the report circulated today that the Athletics had deserted the fraternity I can say without the slightest danger of contradiction that there have been no defections from our organization from any source. We have known all along just where the Athletics stood and their attitude today is just the same as it has been for months. It is true they did not sign our petition, being the only team of the thirty in the fraternity which did not do so, but their failure was due to the pre-occupation incident to a successful and potent fight and a world's success and not to any hostility to our requests.

The report that they opposed our petition because they had no grievances and did not want to appear in a hostile attitude toward Mr. Mack, portrays them in a very selfish light as though utterly callous to the hardships of others. I think that this statement is exceedingly unfair to them, and in view of Mr. Mack's attitude is so illogical as to brand it untrue on its face. Mr. Mack has already expressed himself as in favor of many of our requests and I am quite sure he does not look upon the petition as antagonistic to him in any sense. It is, therefore, quite apparent that his players could have no cause to do so.

To those who understand the situation the report coming at this time is somewhat significant. We have expected for a long time attempts of this kind to

## WILL NOT ALLOW DEPUTIES TO ENTER MINE LEVELS

BINGHAM, Utah, Dec. 10.—Although miners worked today without fear of being harmed in parts of the Utah-Apex mine, no sheriff or deputy has penetrated the tunnels in search of Ralph Lopez, slayer of six men, since yesterday.

A reward of \$1,000 offered by the state for the capture of the desperado added to the eagerness of the deputies to resume the search that was discontinued when Sheriff Smith decided that Lopez had not succumbed to the gases generated to kill him last week.

The sheriffs in concert late today decided not to allow the deputies to re-enter the mine or to attempt further smudging. Their plan is merely to keep guard at the exits until Lopez is starved out or until no doubt remains that he either is dead or has escaped. Then the mine will be searched thoroughly.

The big indoor meets will be held at Kansas City, Omaha and St. Louis during the month of March.

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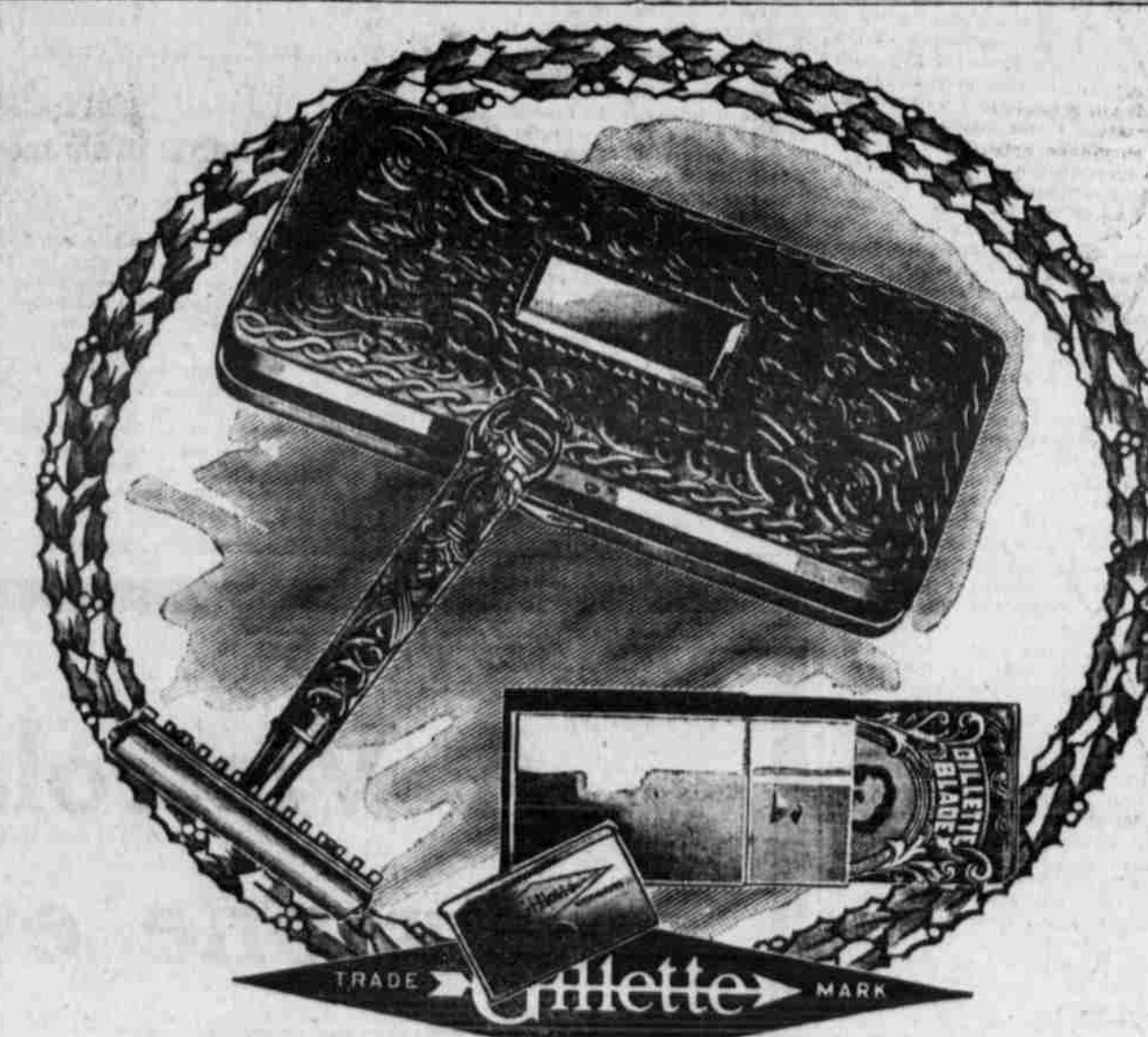
