### IN MEMORY OF BRECKENRIDGE

Bar Association Holds Services in the Federal Court.

JUDGES ARE IN ATTENDANCE

Splendid Tribute is Made to the Memory of Omaha Lawyer Who Lost His Life in Auto Accident at Des Moines.

Before an assemblage of federal and district judges and a representative gathering of members of the Bar association, a resolution of tribute to and address in memoriam of Ralph W. Breckenridge were read in the United States district court room.

The memorial resolution is to be spread upon the minutes of the federal and state courts. It was read by John L. Webster, who also delivered an address. Others speaking on behalf of the Omaha Bar association were Isaac E. Congdon, William F. Gurley, L. F. Crofoot and James H. Macomber. Judge James H. English and Judge W. H. Munger responded. Mr. Webster said in part: "This community, and his many lawyer friends, here and elsewhere, were shocked at the death of Ralph W. Breckenridge. The manner of it was typical of the man. With the strength of an athlete, with the courage of a lion, and the bravery to face any danger, even to the sacrifice of his own life, to save his dear wife from harm, he confronted and seized the on-ward moving automobile that crushed him to his death.

Firm and Fearless.

"He was a man that knew not fear. This firmness, born from the depth of his convictions, was one of his many strong qualities as a successful lawyer. When once engaged in the contests of the forum, he defended the right of his clients as fearlessly and confidentially as the champion of old in the lists of the tournament defied all comers. He had the dauntless courage that would have made him a dashing military leader. Like all such strong characters, he was the most genial and companionable of men.

"We here in this assemblage of judges and lawyers may ask ourselves, 'Where

is James M. Woolworth? Where is John N. Baldwin? Where is Charles J. Greene? Where is Ben T. White? Where is Eliezer Wakeley? Where is George W. Joann? Where is Ralph W. Breckenridge? They are all entombed in the urns and sepulchers of immortality. They were princes—every one of them—but none of them more precious to our memory than Ralph W. Breckenridge."

Mr. Breckenridge was killed in Des Moines, Ia., last summer, when he crashed his automobile while it was in gear.

### Mayor of Sheeley Will Celebrate His Birthday Sunday

Nick Dargaczewski, mayor of Sheeleytown, a prominent Polish citizen of Omaha, formerly city blacksmith for six years, and at present a city inspector, will give a big birthday party and celebration at his home at 302 South Thirtieth street, Sunday afternoon and evening. Many of Omaha's prominent citizens and many of those in public life will attend the jubilee. Mr. Dargaczewski will be 55 years old.

Mr. Dargaczewski has lived in Omaha for thirty years, ever since his immigration to this country, and is one of the most influential Poles in the city.
