Games at Home.

The Cornhusker schedule has already been partially made up and includes home games with Drake and Ames and an eastern trip, during which the two schools are met. The Huskers will also play the Gophers two games at Minneapolis and some of the smaller Iowa colleges on the eastern trip. Coach Stiehm will keep his squad going until the Christmas vacation without attempting to line up a team, but immediately following the holidays he will work on team play. The preliminary work includes practice in throwing baskets, floor work and conditioning the players.

Meets Big Teams.

The Iowa, Minnesota, Ames and Kansas games are already arranged for on the Nebraska schedule. All three schools are under three-year contracts and there never was a question but what the Cornhuskers would meet them. It is certain, however, the Haskell game will be dropped from the Cornhusker schedule, the experience this year proving that too much danger was encountered in the way of injuries in the little prestige that Nebraska might gain by defeating the Indians.

Towle Case Still in the Air.

The case of Captain-elect Max Towle, against whom charges are said to have been filed that he has already participated in three years of athletics, is still hanging fire. Cornhusker students are somewhat amused at the statement accredited to Manager Hamilton of Kansas that Stueve, the captain-elect of the Kansas squad, would be disqualified under circumstances somewhat similar to Towle's case. There is a striking suspicion that the whole affair was a grandstand play of the Kansas Athletic board, including the election of Detweiler to lead the Jayhawkers next season. Stueve's case is not altogether like Towle's, either, for the Kansas Athletic board took official cognizance of the case last season and while the Nebraska board refused to recognize the Nebraska nine, Towle's case may be fought out in the athletic board this week, but Dr. R. G. Clapp, who is credited with raising the question as to Towle's eligibility, is still sick and the athletic board will not meet to pass on the matter until Dr. Clapp is personally able to attend the meeting. It is a foregone conclusion, however, that Towle will be allowed to play another season and accept the responsibility of captain.
