Live Stock to Be Featured at the Big Panama Fair

With a fine determination to excel in all departments of its multitudinous display, the Panama-Pacific International exposition directorate seems destined to fulfill every promise, from that which insures "opinion on time" (February 20, 1913) to that promise which assures the world that a new standard will have been set in exposition history when the pageantry, the pomp, the summed up experience of the nations and the epitomized learning which will be called the exposition, shall have closed its doors, December 4, 1915.

In every department of exposition enterprise there is abroad the spirit which means success because it means to excel. Almost any department of the exposition's energies may be selected as evidence of this spirit and these promises. There is the department of live stock for instance.

In all exhibitions of whatever magnitude or importance there is always an expressed and deep disappointment on the part of a vast majority of the visitors because "the live stock exhibit is over." Difficulties seemingly insurmountable have always prevented exhibitions from maintaining a continuous live stock display; and the universality of regret over this fact arises from the circumstances that practically every man, woman and child in all the world is interested in "live stock" whether that subject be to them summarized in their affections for a pet squirrel, a fluffy, useless but adored dog, a tabby cat, a pony, a goat, a pair of pigeons, or a pitiful pig. Yet, notwithstanding the universal interest in live stock, the display in that department of all exhibitions heretofore has been limited to but a brief period during the life of the exposition. The Panama-Pacific International exposition will be the first to make the display continuous from the opening until the closing day, and during the entire season of a little more than nine months, there will be shown in the spacious area reserved for the livestock section the highest quality of breeds from every corner of the world and the finest horses that travel in harness or under saddle will work out their paces for prizes, the aggregate of which is a fabulous figure. In all of its effort the department of live stock seeks quality rather than numbers.

Special Prizes for Christmas Standing

Contestants should keep in mind the fact that there are three special prizes offered for the highest number of votes at 5 p. m. on Christmas eve, December 24, 1913. These prizes are offered by the Brodegaard Jewelry company and are as follows:

Exposition Notes.
That a marvelous exhibit of domestic animals of the Andes is planned by Argentina at the Panama-Pacific International exposition is news made public by his excellency, Romulo B. Neco, Argentina's ambassador to the United States.

Caz floats are arriving regularly at the Panama-Pacific International freight ferry slip, bearing oars loaded with building material. Upon arrival they are taken by the standard gauge engines of the exposition railway and carried to any part of the grounds where needed, even into exhibit palaces. The colors were suggested by Jules Guerin, director of color of the exposition.

The fertile soil brought to the Panama-Pacific International exposition grounds from the interior valleys of California, which has been placed over the barren sand and gravel, is such that large quantities of mushrooms have sprung up and are eagerly picked by employes and visitors who've found. The grass sown on this surface will spring up quickly and grows luxuriantly.

Blue, gold and orange have been chosen as the official colors of the Panama-Pacific International exposition and will be employed on the exposition flags and banners. The diagonals of the flag are blue and the body orange. In the center is the setting sun of gold with a batteled in outline passing through the Panama canal. The colors were suggested by Jules Guerin, director of color of the exposition.

In addition to great musical festivals, such as the Welsh National Eisteddfod, the German Sengenfest and others, there will be constant music on the Panama-Pacific International exposition grounds throughout the whole period of the celebration. There will be both military and orchestral playing practically all day in some part or parts of the exposition grounds. Ten thousand dollars will be offered by the Eisteddfod in the chief musical competition.
