TO HARNESS STATE WATERS

President of Co-Operative Farmers Has Ideas of Conservation.

MANY ATTEND THE CONVENTION

Visitors Look Over the Grain Men at Work in the Exchange—Lively Discussion in the Evening.

Suggestions of harnessing the rivers of the state to furnish electric power for the farms and towns were made by J. H. Canaday of Minden, president of the Farmers' Co-Operative Grain and Live Stock association, in his opening address at the opening of the annual convention of the association at the Hotel Rome yesterday. "I would have the state put in the plan, and would have the people pay for the current according to what they use. I am not an engineer, but I have talked with men who are, and they believe the scheme is a feasible one. A Burlington civil engineer told me that if an adequate market could be furnished in the state for the current, the plant could be built and operated so that the current need not cost more than 1 or 2 cents per kilowatt.

"I have been told by competent engineers," continued Mr. Canaday, "that the Loup river and the Niobrara especially have abundant facilities for the development of water power. I am not in favor of giving or selling these water rights to private corporations, but I believe the state itself should develop them."

President Canaday went on to suggest that the power could be carried all over the state by wires and cables, and that it could be used not only in lighting, but could be used as power for pumping water, especially for irrigation purposes in the west. He said he believed that if this power was available, it would be possible to water some of the western lands by a system of wells where the pumping could be done on all the time. The speaker also went into the subjects of the conservation of the waters of the Platte river and the other large rivers of western Nebraska, with a view to suggesting some means of using the water to saturate the subsoil. "It has been demonstrated with us," he continued, "that if we get our subsoil sufficiently soaked up in the winter or spring, that we can raise a crop even when the summer is very dry. Now why should we not direct our attention to the subject with a view to learning if some way cannot be devised to lead the enormous volume of water that the Platte carries off every winter and spring, not to the gulf, but out on the divider where it can soak into the ground and get the subsoil into such shape that we can raise a crop whether the summer or dry or not."

Mr. Canaday said he saw no reason why under a system of harnessing rivers in the state, the farmers should not have electric lights in their homes as well as the people of the cities and towns.

Nearly 300 farmers arrived from various parts of the state for the first session, which were held in the afternoon. By 5:30 in the morning over 100 had enrolled. At 10 o'clock in the morning a committee of the Omaha Grain exchange escorted the crowd to the grain exchange in the Brandeis building, where they had an opportunity of watching the operation of the big grain market of the west.

Addresses of welcome were made in the afternoon at the regular session, followed by the president's address. The report of the secretary-treasurer and the field report of the secretary was made, followed by other reports and discussions.
