ROSILLO WINS CUBAN PRIZE

Aviator Flies from Key West to Havana.

ABOUT TWO HOURS ON THE WAY

Cuban Government, Which Will Pay Him Ten Thousand Dollars, Sends Cruiser and Gunboat to Act as Escort.

KEY WEST, Fla., May 17.—Aviator Domingo Rosillo left for the Florida East Coast railroad terminal at 5:35 this morning in an airplane in his attempt to fly from Key West to Havana in competition for a \$10,000 prize offered by the city of Havana. A report received here at 7:47 o'clock stated that Rosillo was flying over Havana at 7:33.

Angeline F. via, another Cuban aviator, attempted to make the flight shortly after Rosillo started, but was forced by high wind to turn back.

Before Rosillo's departure Parla sent a delegation to him asking that the flight be postponed. Rosillo declined to consider it. When Parla was informed of this he was said to have threatened to kill himself and was declared to have placed a revolver against his temple. Friends interfered and Parla decided to attempt the flight, which he later was forced to abandon after two wires of his hydro-

plane had snapped from strain caused by high winds.

HAVANA, May 17.—Rosillo, the Cuban aviator, arrived here in his airplane from Key West at 8:10 this morning. The Cuban government offered a prize of \$10,000 to any aviator accomplishing the flight and sent a cruiser and two gunboats to patrol the route.

MRS. LINCOLN'S LETTERS TO BE SOLD AT AUCTION

NEW YORK, May 17.—What are known as Mrs. Lincoln's "bitter letters" are to be sold at auction here next week. The collection consists of twelve letters written by the widow of the martyred president in the years just following his assassination. In some of them Mrs. Lincoln was almost hysterical in upbraiding congress for not providing for her and in her denunciation of General Grant.

One letter written in August, 1865, asks a friend to try to sell the black lace gown which Mrs. Lincoln wore at the second inauguration "for two hours only" in order to raise money for the support of herself and two boys. The gown was one presented to her by a friend of her husband and it cost \$150.

In another letter, dated December 20, 1865, Mrs. Lincoln writes bitterly of the fortunes of the Grant family as compared with her own and declares that "General Grant's services to his country were certainly not superior to my husband's."

Quick Justice for Man Who Attacked Chief of Police

FORT MADISON, Ia., May 17.—Within forty hours after having slashed the throat of Chief of Police J. B. Watkins, George Switzer today began a thirty-year sentence for the crime in the penitentiary here.

Switzer attacked the chief of police on Thursday afternoon. Today he waived preliminary examination and the county attorney exercised the right under the state law to bring the case immediately before the district court.

Before District Judge Hamilton, Switzer pleaded guilty to a charge of assault with intent to commit murder, and sentence was quickly imposed. Ten minutes later Switzer was taken down the street to the penitentiary to begin his term.

Chief Watkins found Switzer lying on the ground, apparently intoxicated, Thursday afternoon. He attempted to investigate when the man lunged at him with a pocketknife, cutting his throat from ear to ear. The chief is said to be out of danger.

Prince Henry and Princess Margarete Married in Potsdam

POTSDAM, Germany, May 17.—The marriage of Prince Henry XXIII of Prussia and Princess Victoria Margarete of Russia, only daughter of Prince Frederick Leopold of Prussia, was celebrated at the New Palace here this morning. The ceremony was the same as it is to be employed in Berlin on May 24 at the nuptials of her friend and comrade, Princess Victoria Luise, the only daughter of Emperor William.

WOMAN MAKES NEW CHARGE AGAINST HEETER

PITTSBURGH, Pa., May 17.—The investigation of alleged immorality against S. L. Heeter, superintendent of public schools at Pittsburgh, now in progress by a committee of citizens composed of bishops, ministers and business men, took a new angle late yesterday, when a former stenographer in Heeter's employ made affidavit of "undue familiarity" which caused her to quit her position, she states. He brands her story as "another malicious lie."

making of that flour. The small tariff on wheat proposed by the pending bill, in my judgment, a deception—an attempt to deceive the farmers by making them believe that wheat is protected. But when the products of wheat are admitted free, as this bill proposes, every intelligent wheat producer will readily see that this supposed protection of wheat really amounts to nothing. The farmer will not be protected and the milling industry of the country will be ruined.

Favors Steel Trust.

"This bill places some of the products of the steel industry on the free list. At the same time, it increases the duty on some of the necessary ingredients of steel, the production of which in the United States is absolutely controlled by the steel trust. This can have no other effect than work injury to every independent steel manufacturer and give greater protection to the steel trust."

"I would like to consider a tariff bill from a purely nonpartisan standpoint. I would like to see the present bill amended so that I could vote for it, I have absolutely no prejudice against the bill because it has originated with the democratic party, but there seems to be a strong desire on the part of those in control to make this measure a partisan measure. It is an attempt to carry out the old theory that has been applied by all political parties in the past, to work up a strong partisan feeling over the tariff with a view to obtaining party solidarity, and by this method cover up and distract attention from the many inaccuracies, injustices and 'sneak' bills."

SIoux CITY IN LIMELIGHT

Morals of Town to Come Under State Censorship.

AWAITS HIGH COURT DECISION
Folk County, Iowa, Supervisors Confronted with Problem of Return of Low Values of Farm Lands by Assessors.

DES MOINES, Ia., May 17.—Special.

Attorney General Conson will probably start an investigation into affairs at Sioux City soon. He has received complaints from a number of persons as to morals and the enforcement of laws and a demand has been made for ouster proceedings under the state law, against certain of the city officials for failure to perform their duty in the matter of keeping the city clean.

The attorney general received an especially strong letter protesting that the officials are not proceeding to prevent vice in Sioux City. He is awaiting the decision of the supreme court whether he may go directly to the grand jury.

Farm Values an Issue.

The Board of Supervisors of this county is confronting a problem as to assessments and it is said to be similar to a situation which prevails generally in the state. Despite it is known that farm land values have been on the increase, the returns from assessors show a decrease in assessed value of lands in every township of the county and there are not as many acres as there were a few years ago.

Body of Lieutenant Hill Is Buried with Full Military Honors

FORT DODGE, Ia., May 17.—(Special.)—Lieutenant Richard Hill, of the United States naval service, who took his life at Annapolis last week, was buried here today after impressive funeral services. One of the ministers was Rev. Percival Hughett, pastor of the First Congregational church at Detroit, Mich.

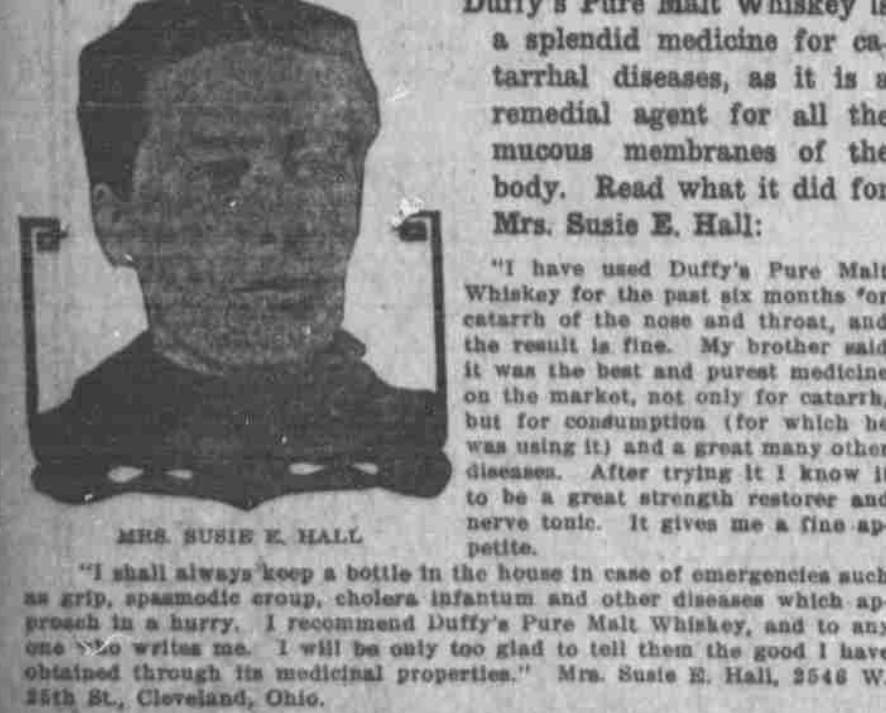
The young man was buried in full uniform and across the coffin was draped the country's flag. On the flag was the sword the deceased naval officer had carried. At the Naval academy at Annapolis a few days ago, a full military funeral was observed. These honors are accorded only to officers who die with their names free from blemish in the service of their country and the general conclusion regarding the manner of the young man's death, is that it was accidental or that breaking health which had made him moribund lately, damaged his mind so that he committed the deed.

A letter from Captain J. H. Gibbons, superintendent of the naval academy, to the deceased young man's mother, is filled with high tribute to him as concerns his moral integrity and the quality of his scholarship.

"In view of all the circumstances connected with his death I hope you will find in this estimate of his character which comes from his official record and the testimony of those who knew him best, some consolation for that great loss which the service in a marked degree shares with you," he wrote.
