

FLEGE GETS THIRD TRIAL

Man Accused of Sister's Murder Secures Another Chance.

JURY CHOSEN IRREGULARLY

Supreme Court Finds Several Jurors Said on Stand They Had Read Accounts of Murder in the Papers.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, May 17.—(Special)—The case of Wilhelm Flege, twice tried for the murder of his sister, Louise, was reversed and remanded back to the Dixon county court in supreme court today. Flege was first tried and convicted of murder in the second degree and given a life sentence. He received a new trial and was convicted the second time of manslaughter and given a sentence of from one to ten years. The court reverses the case because of irregularities in picking of the jury, it being shown that several of the jury had said on the stand that they had read accounts of the murder in the papers and had expressed opinions. One of these was the foreman of the jury. It is also asserted that A. R. Davis, who assisted in the prosecution of the case at the time of the hearing in justice court, attorney for Albert Eichencamp, a hired man on the Flege farm, who was suspected of the murder and therefore had no right to appear in the case as a prosecutor. Eichencamp was the principal witness against Flege, claiming that he had seen him shoot his sister about 1 o'clock in the afternoon. The testimony showed that Miss Flege had partaken of a hearty dinner and in the second trial the testimony of a physician from Chicago who had taken up the body and examined the stomach, showed that the food was in a state of digestion, which showed that the girl could not have been shot until late in the afternoon. When Flege was on the stand, he was asked by the attorney for the state, whether he had read any newspaper accounts of the murder of his sister. He answered that he had read accounts of the murder in the papers. The court found this to be a material violation of the rules of evidence and reversed the verdict. The case will be retried at a later date.

Notes of Tecumseh and Johnson County

TECUMSEH, Neb., May 17.—(Special)—The case wherein G. B. Fielding of Tecumseh asks damages from the Burlington Railroad company in the sum of \$10,000 for injuries received in a runaway caused, as is charged, by negligence on the part of trainmen in scaring a team which ran away, has been taken from the Johnson county district court to the Lincoln branch of the federal court. This was done upon motion of the railroad company. The Johnson county drainage board has been used in district court for \$67.50 by the Towle Engineering company of Omaha. The Omaha company contends that the amount is due for services rendered in engineering work wherein the Nemaha river is to be drained through this county. The Tecumseh school board has secured the services of Prof. L. C. Williams of Manhattan, Kan., to instruct in articulture the coming year. Practical work will be done, the schools having secured ground for the work. L. F. Grimes of Sterling has resigned as a member of the Johnson county drainage board.
