Woman's Relief Corps to Celebrate in Their Memory on Decoration Day by Launching a Flower Ship.

Woman's Relief Corps. As a tribute to the naval dead the Woman's Relief corps will launch a Memorial day flower ship on the pond in Miller park, May 28. About forty men, both of present and past enlistment of the navy, will be in attendance. There will also be a firing squad for the ritual service of Garfield circle of the relief corps at the exercises to be conducted at the unknown graves in Forest Lawn cemetery. Hereafter the flower ship will be launched in the river at the foot of Douglas street, but in order to enable more people to witness the ceremonies the change has been made.

Students from All Over Enter Creighton Summer School.

GLEE CLUB MEMBERS DINED

Nebraska Medical Association Gives Banquet to Them Tuesday Evening at Rome Hotel.

Summer school will begin at Creighton university June 23. Arrangements are being made for a number of noted lecturers to give courses at this session. The advance enrollment has been surprisingly large, and it is now an assured success. Headquarters will be maintained at the law college, where a bureau of information will be established for the convenience of visitors. The lectures will be given in the college of law and professional departments.

An enrollment of 150 is now practically certain, 75 per cent of whom are women. They will come from all over the west, some living as far west as California. Eleven will come from Kansas City, Mo. A great part of the students are school teachers who wish to take advanced work or brush up on some extra branches. Fifteen members of the Creighton University Glee club were the guests at the banquet given by the Nebraska Medical association Tuesday evening at the Rome hotel. The glee club men rendered several selections.

Rev. William F. Rigge, S. J., astronomer at Creighton university, has been officially notified of his election to a Fellowship in the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Father Rigge was apprised several months ago of the fact through a scientific publication, but the official notification has just been received from the secretary of the association.

The recent announcement of the engagement of Raymond G. Young to Miss Jindys Lobeck is of more than usual interest to Creighton university students, as Mr. Young is a very popular professor at the law department of that school. Dr. Lewis J. Fisher, dentist '12, was married recently at Weston, Neb., to Miss Anna Margaret Novak.

Perry Wheeler, Creighton law '13, was recently re-elected city clerk of South Omaha, and Eugene D. O'Sullivan, class '16 of the same school, was defeated for city attorney of that city.

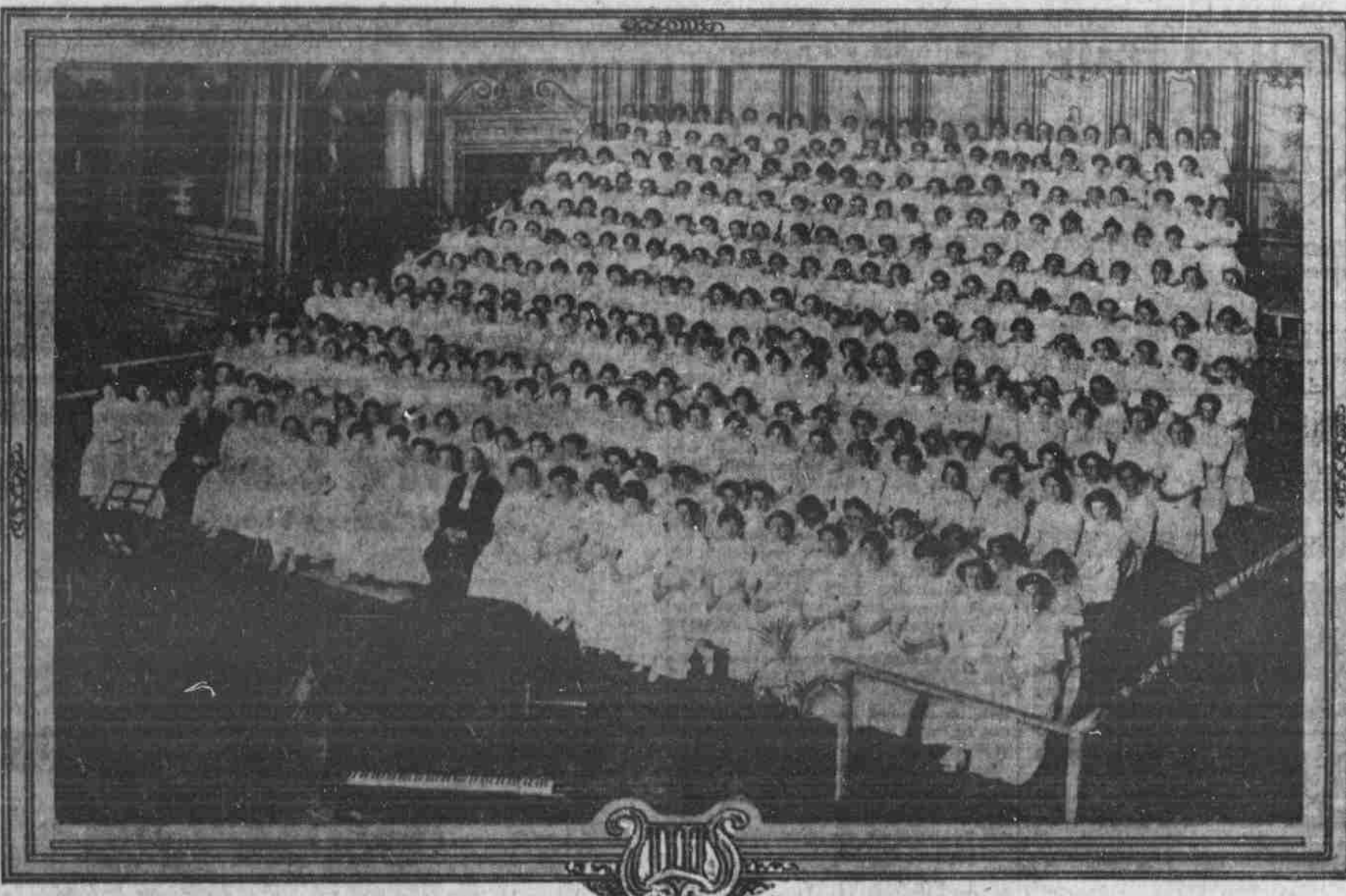


OMAHANS WILL TAKE ANOTHER STEAMSHIP

Owing to damage it sustained during a storm on the Elbe river the sailing date of the steamship Imperator of the Hamburg line has been cancelled. The boat was to have sailed from New York June 7, and twenty-five Omaha and Nebraska people had been booked for passage. W. E. Block, the local agent, after receiving notice that the boat had been put out of service for a time, commenced to hustle and has succeeded in booking his people on other boats equally as good and in such a manner as to not delay their leaving.

At the time when struck by the storm the Imperator was near the city of Altenbruch, Germany, and was bound for New York. The passengers were taken aboard other vessels and brought to New York without experiencing any delay.
