PROFIT EVEN AT REDUCTION Appraiser Figures Gas Could Be Sold for Ninety-Three Cents. FRANCHISE IS NOW COMPLETE Details of Instrument Are Practically Agreed Upon—However, Another Conference Must Be Held. City Commissioners will have the power under the gas franchise ordinance now being prepared to contract with the gas company for gas at any price for any period of time not exceeding ten years, if the price of the gas to the private consumer is not more than \$1 per 1,000 cubic feet. The price may be 25 cents, or any reasonable lesser rate.

Dr. Kharas Granted Stay of Sentence by the President WASHINGTON, May 26.—President Wilson today granted an indefinite stay of sentence to Dr. Theodore Kharas of Elmira, N. Y., convicted at Omaha of using the mails to defraud and sentenced to four months' imprisonment and \$400 fine. Kharas sold stock in a company promoting an invention, which Congressman Bremner and Baker of New Jersey told the president today had since proved successful. The president's action saved Kharas from going to jail tomorrow.
