CHICAGO, June 2.—Wheat today suffered a sharp decline chiefly owing to rains in western Kansas and in parts of Oklahoma. The market closed weak at a net loss of 1½@1½c to 1½@1½c. Latest prices for corn were a shade to ½c off and for oats ½c down to 1-15c gain. In the provisions the outcome varied from 2½c lower to an upturn of 7½c.

Although the rain southwest did not appear to have been general the effect on sentiment in the wheat pit was instantaneous and was decisive for the day. The trade had been prepared as a rule for an exciting buil market, but there was a rush of longs to the selling side and prices rapidly gave way. Rumors of export sales did not develop any rallying power in wheat News of a big decrease in the visible supply proved equally without effect as an aid to the buils.

Seaboard clearances of wheat and flour equaled 1,229,000 bushels. Primary receipts of wheat were 882,000 bushels; a year ago, 383,000 bushels.

Corn was upheld by a fair amount of commission buying. Rural offerings were rather meager and shipping demand good. The unfavorable crop prospects had a steadying effect on oats.

Resting orders to buy at a decline ralfied the provisions market. At first, however, the list was under considerable pressure on account of the heavy run of hogs.

Heavy Pressure Against Issues with Breaks in Many Instances.

CANADIAN PACIFIC IS WEAK

Action of Market is Determined Largely by Attitude of Foreign Holders of American Securities.

NEW YORK, June 2.—Heavy pressure was directed against stocks today and on an increased volume of business prices in many instances broke severely. Canadian Pacific, the exceptionally weak feature, fell 13 points, a loss within a week of 23 points. Union Pacific declined 4%, Reading 5, Amaigamated 1½ and other standard issues 1 to 2 points. Over thirty stocks of which Atchison, Canadian Facific, New York Central, Northern Pacific, Pennsylvania and Union Pacific are the most prominent, broke to the lowest quotations reached this year. The average price of average stocks fell to the lowest figure since 199.

The action of the market was determined largely by the attitude of foreign holders of American securities. The unpleasant impression made abroad, particularly in France, by the St. Louis & San Francisco led to a slump in American securities in London during the holiday period here, in which time Canadian Pacific broke 3 points. When trading was resumed here London came into the market as a heavy seller, not only of Canadian Pacific, but Union Pacific, Steel, Amalgamated and others stocks.
