Dr. Foote and Dr. Herlischer have studied the same subject together before. Much time is required for the work, as Dr. Foote grinds all his cross sections to a transparent thinness by hand.

Dr. Foote within the last few years has taken up the special study of the microscopic appearance of bones. He has dispelled many of the false ideas held concerning bone formation. He has proven false many facts generally accepted from the early students of bone structure.

Dr. Foote was recently made a Fellow in the American Association for the Advancement of Selance. He and Rev. William F. Rigge, S. J., astronomer at Creighton university, are the only Omaha man holding fellowships in the association.
