TREATY RENEWALS HELD UP

Senate Again Fails to Ratify Extension of Agreements.

TOLLS DISPUTE IS THE TROUBLE

Members Opposed to Seeing Question Referred to Hague Tribunal

WASHINGTON, June 7.—The principle of compulsory arbitration written into the code that has bound the United States with twenty-four great and lesser nations of the world for the last five years is in serious danger, and unless there is a decided change in sentiment in the senate, the renewal of twenty-three of the treaties which gave concrete evidence of this nation's belief in such a policy, may be impossible.

The main argument tonight arose over the contention that if the treaty with Great Britain is ratified the Panama canal tolls question would have to be submitted to The Hague, but during the discussion the Japanese question and the general attitude of the nation toward compulsory arbitration was brought up and led to the expression of views utterly at variance with entrance into such binding agreements in the future.

A motion to re-refer the three treaties to the foreign relations committee, with instructions that the one with Great Britain be modified so as to exempt specifically the Panama canal tolls question, was abandoned, but prolonged debate was predicted for future sessions.

Senator Works made a speech bringing up the Panama canal tolls question.

PLUMBERS IN LIME LIGHT

Evidence Secured at Des Moines that They Are in a Combine.

GRAND JURY TO TAKE IT UP

Custodian of City Hall Stands Accused of Being Partner in Plumbing Company and Aiding in Getting Contracts.

(From a Staff Correspondent) DES MOINES, Ia., June 7.—(Special Telegram.)—Evidence which developed at the city hall in regard to prices for plumbing will lead to a probe by the grand jury of allegations that the master plumbers are in a combine and have violated the state law in this respect. The custodian of the city hall stands accused of being a partner in a plumbing company and aiding in securing contracts. He has retaliated by telling something of the manner in which the plumbers get together to handle the business. An effort will be made to break up the combine and reduce prices.

Iowa Travelers Meet. The annual convention of the United Commercial Travelers of Iowa was attended by nearly 1,200 members, and nearly every large city of the state was represented by delegations. Four bands participated in the program which the traveling men gave today. Meetings were held of the association and women's auxiliary.

Decide Moon Law Case. The supreme court today decided the appealed case from Scott county involving the application of the Moon law to special charter cities, and virtually refused to pass on the main question because of the fact that the legislature at the last session passed a law changing the whole status of the saloons in those cities. The new law legalizes all the saloons without regard to number of inhabitants, and provides for gradual reduction in the number until after a few years the limitations of the Moon law as to number of saloons will apply in full.

Enter New Street Car Deceit. The supreme court today entered a decree in the street car case in Des Moines providing that the company shall have no rights whatever, but is given until March 22, 1915, to secure a franchise or decide upon abandoning the streets. After that time it is subject to ouster proceedings.

The supreme court upheld the verdict in Scott county of mayor's arrest in degree against Anna Kilduff, who followed her husband into a fish market and killed him. She immediately confessed. A question was raised as to her sanity.

Library Secretary Retires. Alice S. Tyler, for thirteen years secretary of the Iowa Library commission and in charge of the traveling library work for Iowa, has resigned and will accept a position in Cleveland, O., next fall. She has also been a conspicuous club woman in the state.

Governor Clarke went to Iowa City today for the purpose of attending the state university commencement and being present at the review of the college cadets on "Governor's day."

Druggists and Medicines. It is asserted that the druggists of Iowa and the makers of various medicines will undertake to get together at the coming convention of the Iowa Pharmaceutical association at Waterloo and adjust their differences as to the manner of marketing this product. There has been much friction between the two because of the sale of medicines to department and general stores and by peddlers. There was also a serious difficulty which arose during the legislature when an effort was made to pass a bill that would require a license from all makers of proprietary medicines before their stuff could be sold in Iowa.

Life-Termers Are Active Again. The governor has been receiving a number of applications for parole from the life termers in prison. These are all cases that have been passed on by commissioners in recent months and will be referred back to the same board for investigation. Only a few of the more important life cases will be taken up directly by the governor.

Trial of Four Bankers. Four former bankers will be tried in federal court in Fort Dodge, beginning June 10.

The four men charged with violations of the federal banking laws by the grand jury last November are Charles L. Larson of Forest City, J. C. Preston of Crystal Lake, H. M. Martinson of Lake Mills and J. G. Larson of Crystal Lake.

Particulars of the details contained in the charges have not been given out by federal court officials, but it is understood certain entries in the bank books would not conform to the federal regulations.

Mr. Larson of Crystal Lake was arrested in Hidalgo county, Missouri. When in jail here he declared a misunderstanding caused his trouble. Three of the men have been out on \$10,000 bail each.

DISCUSSES PAPER SCHEDULE

Senate Subcommittee Considers Retaliatory Duty Clause.

MATTER HANGS IN BALANCE

Leaning is Toward Placing Countervailing Rate Against Canada on Pulp and Print Material.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 7.—For several hours today the senate finance subcommittee, of which Senator Johnson of Maine is chairman, discussed the paper schedule of the Underwood tariff bill, and it is reported tonight that an amendment to put a retaliatory duty against Canada on print paper valued at not more than two and one-half cent a pound is being seriously considered.

Because the majority of the subcommittee was inclined to this view, they submitted from New York John Norris, chairman of the paper committee of the American Newspaper Publishers' association, who today reiterated opposition to the imposition of any retaliatory duty.

No decision was reached, but it was learned from an authoritative source that the matter hangs in the balance with the leaning toward putting in the countervailing duty. In the Underwood bill, retaliatory duties are imposed on higher grade papers valued at more than two and one-half cents a pound. The import tax is fixed at 12 per cent ad valorem, and the countervailing duty is directed against Canada because of restrictions on pulp woods and pulp.

The proposal of the American amendment to the tariff bill, which would put an increased graduated tax on tobacco and its manufacture in accordance with a plan submitted by Attorney General McReynolds, it was reported today, may not be accepted by the finance committee.

LAW FORBIDS POISONING

HOPPERS IN NEW MEXICO

WASHINGTON, June 7.—Harris B. Smith, the Agricultural department's entomological expert to aid in the fight against a grasshopper invasion in New Mexico, reported today that a state law prohibiting the spreading of poison is delaying efforts to exterminate the pests.

The department has recommended the use of a mixture containing parts green. Lawyers are examining the New Mexico law, which was designed to prevent the poisoning of cattle in an unfenced country, to see whether its provisions are ironclad.
