## Favorite Recipes of Favorite Stage Stars



My latest culinary achievement is a little muffin of bran that should be eaten by everyone wishing a nice, clear skin. If you are already blessed with just that kind of a skin, the muffins will insure you against ravages of time and wind and lobster a la Newburgh.

Here is my method of procedure: First, I gather all my materials, so that there shall be no scurrying about for some needed article at the last moment.

- 1 quart of bran.
- 1 pint of whole wheat flour.
- 1 saltspoon salt.
- 12 tablespoonful New Orleans molasses.
- 2 teaspoonful cooking soda.
- 1 1/2 cups milk, or enough to make a good batter.

Mix the bran, flour and salt together thoroughly; then add the molasses, and next, about one and one-quarter cups of the milk, saving one-quarter cup by which to dissolve the soda. Finally, add the milk, which has been thoroughly blended in the small amount of milk, and bake your muffins in gem pans in a hot oven.
