TONS OF FIREWORKS GO OFF

Two Persons Hurt by Explosion at Deerfield, O.

DAMAGE IS FORTY THOUSAND

Two Churches, Mill and Several Residences Were Partially Wrecked by Force of Concussion.

ALLIANCE, O., June 11.—Four persons were injured, two seriously, early this morning, when five tons of fireworks, stored in the flour mill of W. A. Wilmet at Deerfield, ten miles north of here, blew up.

Four Killed by Explosion. RACINE, Wis., June 11.—Two men were killed and at least four others injured today, when the boilers of a coal barge blew up.

GIANT IMPERATOR BEGINS FIRST TRIP

HAMBURG, Germany, June 11.—The giant steamship, Imperator, started from here on its maiden trip to New York at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

One of the most severe storms which have occurred this season, drove all except the biggest craft to shelter today in the harbors along the coast.

The Imperator started from an anchorage in the open roadstead. It is too big to lie at the regular pier and routed up its special moorings in the recent gale.

Annual Meeting at Lincoln Bars Reference to It. Royal D. Mead Says His Salary is Thousand a Month.

LIST OF SCHOOL GRADUATES MONEY SPENT FOR ADVERTISING

Names of Those Who Will Receive Degrees at the Annual Commencement of University of Nebraska. E. W. Mayo, Former Head of Press Bureau, is Paid Two Hundred a Week to Conduct Publicity Campaign.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—Activities of Hawaiian sugar interests in behalf of a tariff on sugar were taken up again today by the senate lobby committee.

Royal D. Mead, of the Hawaiian sugar planters' association, said he received a salary of \$1,000 a month for his work in Washington. His efforts, he said, were confined to the gathering and distribution of sugar statistics and he thought \$15,000 would cover his annual expenditures.

He had been associated with the domestic sugar producers' organization, which has directed the sugar tariff publicity campaign in Washington. In May he said, he and Sidney M. Ballou terminated a \$2,000 contract for publicity work by the Press Service bureau, of which E. W. Mayo was head.

Mead produced a detailed account of all his receipts and expenditures in Washington. He had received \$5,000 from the Hawaiian Sugar association and had spent \$1,548.15 up to last night.

Upon the demand of Senator Gronna, the committee today subpoenaed A. Y. More, publisher, and A. M. Baker, manager of the Courier-News of Fargo, N. D., to explain a recent editorial intimating that Senator Gronna knew something of the use of money in Washington to influence legislation.

Two Hundred a Week for Mayo. Mead told the committee that after terminating the \$2,000 publicity contract with Mayo, the domestic sugar producers had retained Mayo at a salary of \$300 a week to help run the sugar publicity campaign. None of the money spent for advertising, said Mr. Mead, had been used to influence the editorial policy of newspapers.

The total amount spent by the Hawaiian planters association for all purposes, was about \$400,000 a year, he said, being something less than \$1 a ton on the total production. Most of the money had been used, he said, for a sugar experiment station in Hawaii and for securing Philippine laborers.

Dredging Record at Panama Broken

PANAMA, June 11.—The record of the monthly dredging operations in the canal was broken in May, when 1,900,000 cubic yards of earth was removed from the two entrances. The greater amount was taken out at the Atlantic end, where a large part of the earth removed consisted of silt washed into the canal by ocean currents.

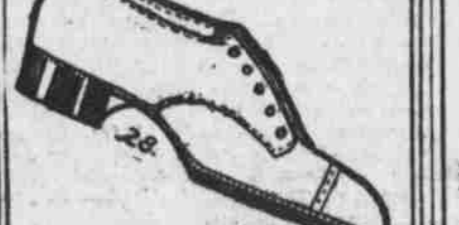
