Omaha, Unable to Find the Ball, is Defeated by St. Joe.

ROURKE TRIES THREE PITCHERS

Near Fight Occurs When Some Boosters for the Visitors Become Personal in Their Remarks.

St. Joseph batters bunched their hits in the third and fifth innings yesterday and by taking advantage of errors and walks slipped eleven runs across the plate while Omaha made but five.

Boehler, pitching for the Joes, had the Omaha batters at his mercy, allowing but three scattered hits. Had it not been for his wildness the Houges would not have made a run. He gave eight free passages to first and struck out six men.

For Omaha three pitchers worked and none were effective. Clossman, who heretofore has been the mainstay of this department, was driven from the mound under fire in the third inning, when the Hougers drove in five runs. Robinson, who succeeded him, went wild until the fifth, when the Missourians again started and Fugate was brought to the rescue. A three-base hit off Fugate in the fifth gave St. Joseph three runs, which made a total of six in this frame.

The game was uninteresting and was replete with anything but brilliant playing by either side. The fans quarreled among themselves and a free-for-all fight was narrowly averted in the third inning by the quick work of the police.

Three Men Arrested. Several St. Joseph boosters became personal in their remarks to some Omaha fans and a fight started, which ended up in the diamond and the arrest of three men.

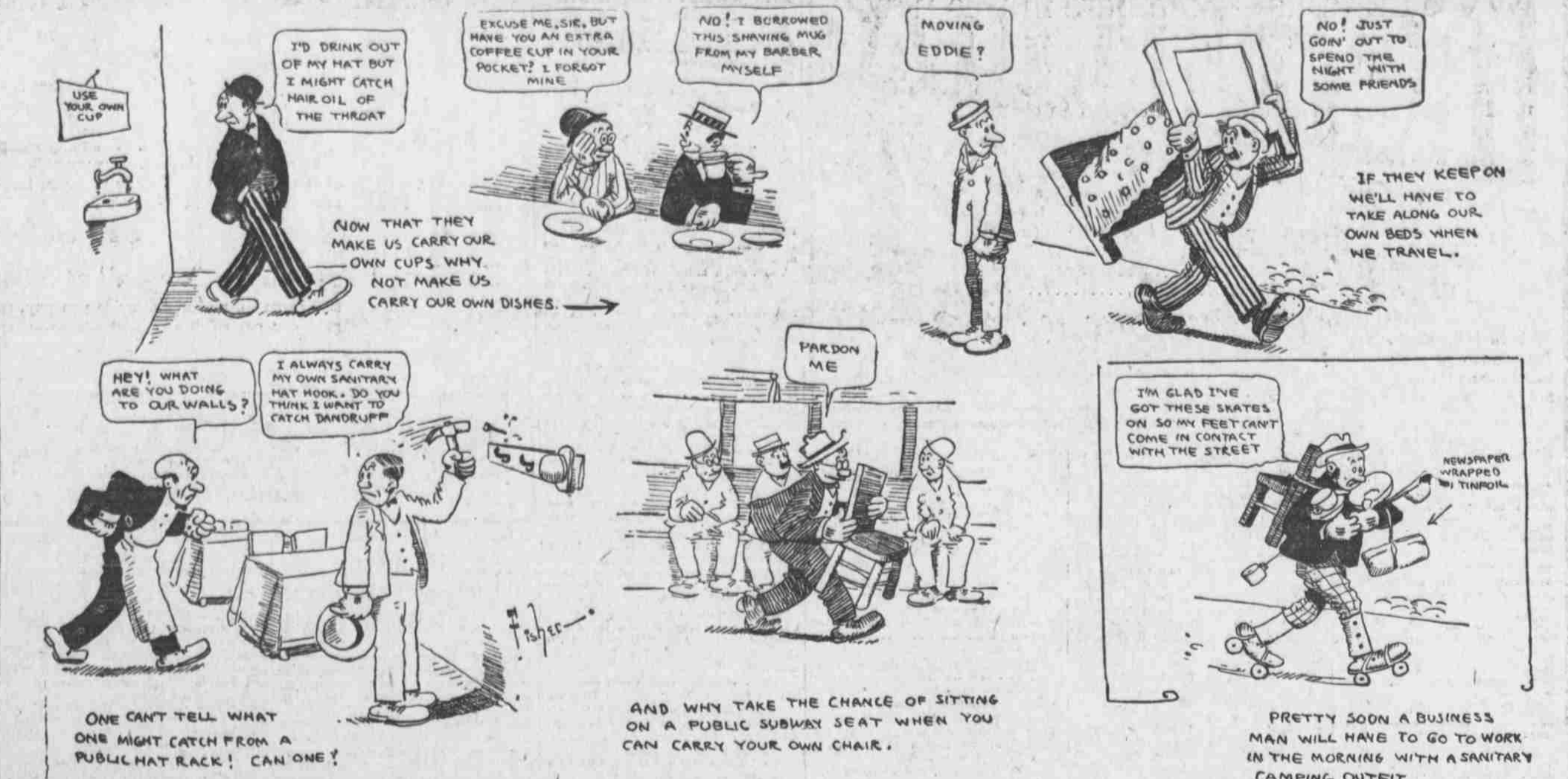

CINCINNATI, O., June 11.—In a game marked by near rioting, in which Manager Tinker of the Cincinnati team and Knabe, the second baseman of the Philadelphia team, were ordered from the field, Cincinnati took the final contest of the series here today by a score of 2 to 2.

The mix up between Tinker and Knabe came in the seventh. Previous to this the two men had engaged in a wordy war at second base and when the Cincinnati manager slid into this sack in the seventh, both players mixed it up while lying on the ground. When they finally stood on their feet they attempted to get together and it required the services of both umpires and a number of players to stop the fracas. Neither was injured.
