MARTIN HAS NEAT SOUVENIR

Preserves Card of First Trade Excursion Out of Omaha.

OPENING OF THE SHORT LINE

Many of the Leading Citizens Who Made the Trip Have Passed Away—Others Are Still In Harness.

The Omaha Commercial club is indebted to Euloid Martin for a most interesting souvenir of the first trade trip ever made in the west. That was twenty-eight years ago—in 1885—the occasion being the formal opening of the Oregon Short Line. The trip was a complimentary one on the part of the Union Pacific Railroad com-

pany and was made to impress the twenty-nine Omaha business men who participated with the possibilities of the new territory and open it to Omaha trade. Twenty-one days were consumed in the trip over the lines of the Union Pacific railroad, Oregon Short Line and the Oregon Railroad and Navigation company to Portland, Seattle and Tacoma, with a side trip to Vancouver and Victoria. Another side trip was made by stage to Shoshone Falls, Idaho, as guests of John A. Creighton and C. H. Dewey, who owned the falls at that time. Mr. Martin, who made the trip, recalls many personal incidents—among others that Luther Drake was the champion fisherman of the party; Captain C. B. Rustin the social "developer," and John A. Creighton and Fred Metz the "jubilee singers." The personnel of this party is here re-

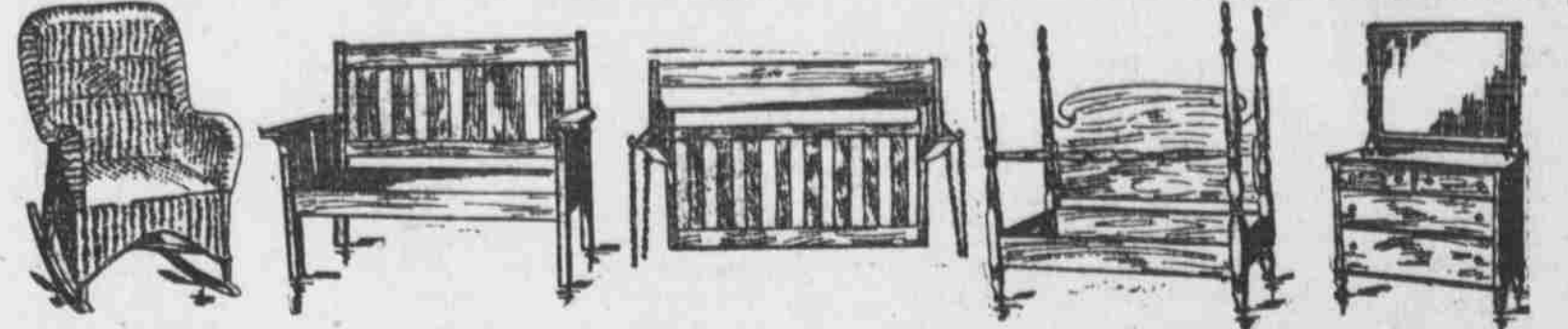
