

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Strength in Wheat Due to the Dry Weather in Some Parts. CORN MARKET IS A SURPRISE Has Absolutely No Selling Pressure and Orders Have to Be Filled with Grain that Has Been Bid Up.

OMAHA, June 16, 1913. The greatest wheat strength displayed in futures are those most directly affected by the dry weather developments in the spring wheat country.

Even more of a surprise than that in wheat was in store for the corn trade last week. The market had absolutely no selling pressure during the entire week and such orders as were attempted to do, and such orders as came from the outside had to be filled by bidding prices higher than the market.

Primary receipts were 1,040,000 bushels and shipments were 547,000 bushels, against receipts last year of 438,000 bushels and shipments of 273,000 bushels.

On the assumption that the rise would proceed further but traders bid up the market in the early trading, but it was evident that outside buying had diminished and that the market was receiving support from the street.
