FRONT CAR IN EACH TRAIN IS TELESCOPED—ACCIDENT CAUSED BY A MISTAKE IN ORDERS—NO BODIES IDENTIFIED.

VALLEJO, Cal., June 19.—Ten adults and one child met death in a collision of interurban trains on the San Francisco, Napa and Calistoga electric line near here today. The number of the injured still a matter of doubt, but probably will exceed twenty-five. A mistake order brought the trains together head-on. The front cars of both trains were completely telescoped by the force of the collision. The victims were pinned down by the wreckage and fire apparatus and a house moving outfit, at work nearby, were used to free them.
