

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Wheat Has Weakest Day of Week in the Pit Friday.

CORN HAS MUCH NEEDED RAIN

Moisture Puts Those on the Bull Side in the Lead as Sellers of the Yellow Cereals—Features of the Trading.

OMAHA, June 21, 1913.

The weakest day witnessed in several weeks was seen in the wheat market yesterday. While prices closed only a few cents from the top levels, with July ice higher and other months a to 1/2c lower for the day, steady support was given to the market on all weak spots. This support was doubtless the result of a wish on the part of the larger holders of the July wheat to dispose of the remainder of their big line at as great an advance as possible. Some sections of the wheat growing country east of Chicago and which have been taking care of their wheat in goodly amounts during the past year or more, were offering to sell that grain, not only in Chicago, but in New York for nearby shipment. The fact that a part of these offerings were old and part new wheat, the former for July and the latter for September shipment, naturally was again a support for the market. Chicago for July and August shipment, 190,000 bushels of No. 2 red winter wheat, and consigned to the Armour Grain Company from the southwest, cash wheat was 1/2c to 1/4c higher.

The much needed rains in Nebraska and Iowa, with a promise of further precipitation to cover the entire corn belt during the next few days, was another supporting influence in that market yesterday. Those who have adhered to the bull side of corn for some time past, were in the lead as sellers of wheat. The old long corn and some of the old time bulls put out short lines. Cash corn was 1/4c to 1/2c lower.

There were price losses in oats yesterday on account of the rains in the west and the promise of rains east of the Mississippi river, where moisture was badly needed. Additional new oats were sold in Chicago yesterday for August shipment at 1/2c to 1/4c below the old time bulls' offer for No. 3 white. Cash oats were 1/2c lower.

Clearances were: Wheat and flour equal to 246,000 bu.; corn, 11,000 bu.; and oats, 15,000 bu.

Livestock closed with wheat unchanged and with corn unchanged to bid lower. Primary wheat receipts were 523,000 bu. and shipments of 479,000 bu., against receipts of 28,000 bu. and shipments of 22,000 bu. last year.

Primary corn receipts were 222,000 bu. and shipments of 538,000 bu., against receipts of 17,000 bu. and shipments of 17,000 bu. last year.
