CLARKS, Neb., June M .- To the Editor of The Bee: The great universities, the colleges, normal, business and agricultural, all send out a call to the farm youth, which they fain would answer, but they cannot. A gulf is fixed over which they may not pass. Nearly all of these institutions of

learning require high school credits, which, in itself is right and necessary, for most of them. But right here lies the trouble. We cannot get these credits without leaving the farm, for four years, and this often means for all time. By the interpretation of the "free high

school law," not more than eight grades may be taught in the rural schools. Everywhere, farmers are becoming justly indignant of this ruling and practice and demand that this restriction be removed.
