OMAHA'S ONE CHANCE SPOILED

Double Play by Cochran and Rapps in Opening Session Stops the Rourke when They Look Dangerous.

Gene Cochran, the lanky Topeka twirler, who pitched a no-hit no-run game at Omaha's expense last fall, came near duplicating that feat yesterday when he let the Rourkes down with two hits, one of which was a scratch, and won the second game of the series for the Kaws by a 4 to 0 score.

The Kansas twirler was in great form. He was a trifle wild at the beginning and passed three men before he settled. Then it was nothing but pop-ups, easy grounders and fouls for the Rourkes, while the Kaws solved Robinson's delivery early in the game.

Thomason was the only Omaha man who could touch Cochran's sizzlers. He collected both Omaha's hits, the first one coming in the third inning. In the eighth he made his second hit when he slammed a terrific liner at Cochran, but the ball bouncing from the long twirler's hands off towards the bleachers. Not a Rourke player reached the third sack during the game.

Manager Arbogast in a desperate attempt to change Omaha's luck altered the lineup, putting Neff in at short and placing catcher Shestak in the left corner. Eddie Wallace adorned the bench.

Lajoie Objects to Staying on Bench

CLEVELAND, O., June 28.—The announcement of Manager Birmingham of the Cleveland American league club, that he intended to bench Napoleon Lajoie, second baseman of the team, has precipitated a feud between Lajoie and Birmingham which threatens the success of the club, President W. Somers admitted here today. Lajoie, sore at heart over being made what he terms a "bench warmer" when he is still able to play, is said to have appealed to Somers for reinstatement as a regular.

Birmingham declares that he only benched Lajoie temporarily, because his broken hands had caused him to slump in his work. He says he intended putting the Frenchman back in the game as soon as he returned to form.

In fifty-three games this season Lajoie has batted .27 and fielded .96. President Somers talked with Lajoie over the long distance telephone today. Afterwards he announced that the trouble in no way menaced Birmingham's position as manager and that he will continue to direct the team as he sees fit. Lajoie will continue with the team as a player, he said. He added that he understood that the second baseman, reconsidering previous declarations he had made, says that he will do as directed by Birmingham.

Huskies Entered in Olympic Games Which Are Held in Chicago

LINCOLN, June 28.—(Special.)—Five Cornhusker and ex-Cornhusker athletes will leave this week for Chicago to take part in the annual international games, better and more popularly known as the American Olympics.

The leader of the Nebraska delegation is Louis Anderson, who is the only Cornhusker athlete to have gained the distinction of representing the United States at the Olympic games in Stockholm last year. Anderson has been assiduously training at his home on a farm near Geneva and has written Lincoln friends that he is in perfect trim for the long distance runs, which he will enter. Anderson should prove a formidable rival to anyone in the distance runs as he held his own in the finals at Stockholm against the world's best distance man.

Although Guy Reed, well known as the fastest sprinter the university has ever had, was sick up until a week ago with smallpox and forced to remain at the isolation hospital, it is more than an even bet that Reed will enter the sprints at Chicago. It all depends on whether the former Husker star can round out into shape in the short time left for him to train, and if Reed believes he is in any kind of shape to run, he will also enter the games.

WINS THE SUBURBAN HANDICAP

Length Batted Comes Labors, Who is Five Ahead of R. F. Carman's Meridian—Nightstick the Fourth.

NEW YORK, June 28.—Whisk Broom II, the big Chestnut son of Broomstick-Audience, is the most talked of horse in America tonight. Carrying the crushing impetus of 1899 pounds, Harry Payne Whitney's 4-year-old horse, flitted by Jockey Nutter, won the suburban handicap at one mile and a quarter over the Belmont park track this afternoon and established a new world's record of two minutes for the distance.

A length away, John O. Talbot's gelding, Lahore, was second, five lengths in front of R. F. Carman's Meridian, which finished third. H. P. Whitney's other entry, Nightstick, was fourth, with G. M. Miller next and Cock of the Walk last.

All six horses were sent away well in motion with the light weighted Nightstick making the pace for Whisk Broom. He opened up a lead of four lengths, while Whisk Broom, under double weight wraps, was outfooting the others. After the long run down the back stretch Nutter took a stronger hold of Whisk Broom and eased him back in the rest of his company while Nightstick continued to race along in front.
