Des Moines Violent Case.
The Des Moines violent case was taken up for a second or third time by the railway commission for completion of the hearing as to the necessity for a viaduct over certain tracks in the southern part of the city. The mayor and city officials and a large number of residents of the city and property owners appeared to show cause why the viaduct should be constructed. The railroads interested appeared to contest the whole matter and to lay foundation for carrying the matter to the courts. The Great Western and the Des Moines City Railway company are most interested.

War Not Declared, But Goes Merrily On
LONDON, July 4.—The twenty-four hours which the Bulgarian government accorded to Greece and Serbia to cease operations have expired. During the same period Bulgaria undertook to abstain from hostilities in order to give Russia time to intervene in favor of peace. But hostilities are being carried on by both sides, apparently with the ferocious characteristics of the Balkan soldiers, and no declaration of war has yet been made. The respective diplomatic representatives are still at their posts.

BRACKEN PROBABLY FATALLY HURT

STAPLETON, Neb., July 4.—(Special.)—JAY MILLER, one of the brakemen on the Union Pacific railroad, which runs in here, was seriously, and probably fatally injured in an accident here Wednesday, a few minutes after the arrival of the train. He was attempting to uncouple the caboose from the train when he was caught between the cars and crushed to such an extent that he was rendered unconscious for some time. He was carried to the station by the other brakemen and at Conductor Van Housen, and there received the attentions of District Surgeon Dr. E. F. Carr. Immediately after the administration of first aid, a special left here for Kearney carrying the patient. He was accompanied by the district surgeon, and it was hoped to improve the patient's chances of recovery by getting him to a hospital. At Kearney an examination disclosed more serious injuries than had at first appeared, and it was given out that the chances of recovery were very remote.

BROWN COUNTY FARMER KILLED UNDER MOTOR CAR

AINSWORTH, Neb., July 4.—(Special Telegram.)—Senator Clark, aged 65 years and one of the best known farmers in Brown county, was killed in an accident near Long Pine this afternoon at 4 o'clock. Clark left Ainsworth with two companions and while the machine was climbing a steep hill the driver speeded up his engine. Clark jumped from the machine, fell against the bank and rolled under the wheels and was run over. He lived but thirty minutes after the accident.

Fullerton Man Killed by Automobile Wreck
